Swimmer Named Top Athlete

Bob Hughes, El Camino College water polo and swimming ace, was selected athlete of the year by members of the college coaching staff last week. Hughes was high scorer on the El Camino College Southern California conference water polo team and placed first in two national swimming competitions as a representative of El Camino College. Hughes paced the Warrior water polo championship to wins over all Southern California colleges, with the exception of U.S.C. who alone defeated the El Camino team. Hughes' national recognition came when he placed first in the 50-yard and 100-yard free style. He captured these honors while placing second in the 220-yard free style in this same national competition.

He is not only an outstanding athlete, but is well liked by his college friends and instructors and is respected by his opponents. In recognition of his accomplishments, Hughes' name is engraved on a perpetual trophy at the college and he himself is awarded a 16-inch "miniature" edition of the large master trophy which was donated to the college by Stadium Enterprises.

Worried About How Many Fish You May Catch?

Ocean sport fishing off the California coast is approaching its seasonal peak, followed closely by a corresponding upswing in arrests for violation of conservation laws, reports the Division of Fish and Game.

Some anglers are confused by additional regulations set this year by the Fish and Game Commission in its perpetual task of juggling fish economies to match supply and demand.

Here's a brief round-up of current bag possession limits on ocean species:

An aggregate limit of 10 fish, applies to bluefin and yellowfin tuna, skipjack, yellowtail, marlin, broadbill swordfish, black and white sea bass, albacore, barracuda, bonito, rock and kelp bass, California halibut, California corbina, yellowfin and spottin croaker, lingcod, and cabezone, provided that not more than two of such fish are marlin, black sea bass or swordfish.

A new regulation makes it illegal to possess more than 15 rockfish in the aggregate of all species. Various members of the rockfish, or Sebastodes, family go by some of the following names: rock cod, trefish, bocaccio, grouper, bluefish, red snapper, chucklehead, and china fish.

Generally, any of the 50 rockfish species found in California waters may be identified by the 13 deeply notched back spines.

Two to five striped bass, and three salmon or steelhead trout rounds out the maximum ocean fish possession limits, except for occasional weight limits. There is no bag limit on any other ocean fish not listed above.

Good advice from the wardens: get a free copy of 1949 angling regulations from any office of the Division of Fish and Game or one of its 2800 license agencies.
