

The dances were temporarily suspended during construction of a new ceiling in the auditorium.


Palos Verdes Crash Injures Foursome

Among the written communications which denounced the game were letters from the Board of Directors of the Torrance Chamber of Commerce; the Board of Managers of the YMCA; the Torrance Council of Churches; W. E. Bowen, former chairman of the Board of Managers of the YMCA and Sunday School Superintendent for 22 years; and Rev. C. M. Northrup, pastor of the First Baptist Church.

One of the protesting letters was signed by Rev. Paul Wenske, pastor of the First Lutheran Church; Rev. Cecil England, pastor of the Christian Church; Rev. C. M. Northrup, pastor of the First Baptist Church; Rev. Ben Langenfelder, retired minister of the First Christian Church; and Rev. U. S. Schauer, pastor of the Central Evangelical United Brethren Church.

According to City Attorney C. Douglas Smith no new ordinance was necessary to allow the game to operate here—only an amendment to the present business license ordinance would be required.

Representing the VFW and urging the passage of such an amendment was Boris Woolley, attorney for the veteran's organization. He said that he had gathered information that 80 per cent of the merchants in the city were in favor of the game. He said:

"I challenge the letters from the Chamber of Commerce and YMCA. I do not believe that those letters represent the sentiment of the two organizations as a whole."

He said that although the game was not a gamble minors would not be permitted to play the game.

When asked who was providing the facilities for the operation of the game Woolley stated that the American Amusement Company, operators of similar games in Pismo Beach and other northern California cities, would furnish the capital to open the game here.

While the City Council was slamming the door that would block the entrance of any possible gambling interest here the Torrance Police were keeping a watchful eye on the Hollywood Riviera Country Club.

Monday of this week the South Bay Daily Breeze, a newspaper published in Redondo, ran a set of two pictures showing one-armed bandits said to have been photographed in the Hollywood Riviera Country Club last Sunday.

When Torrance police headed by acting Police Chief Frank Schumacher, saw the published pictures they "raided" the club, found the machines, but due to an opening in the state laws, they were unable to make a pinch or confiscate the machines.

According to Captain Schumacher who is acting as head of the local police department while Police Chief John Stroh is on vacation, mere possession of the machines is not a violation of the law. No one was playing the machines and therefore no crime was being committed he said. However, a return trip to the club disclosed that the machines had been removed.

Commander William A. Mason, president of the Hollywood-Riviera Home Owners Association, explained that his organization had no knowledge of the presence of the slot machines in the clubhouse. He expressed the opinion that they might have been brought there by a group who had staged a private party there recently.
