Paring of North Torrance School Plans Explained

To clarify the Board of Education's action in paring certain portions from the North Torrance School, the Torrance Herald this week asked Superintendent of Schools Dr. J. H. Hull the motive behind the board's action of last June 7. His statements and those of Dr. Howard A. Wood, president of the Board of Education follow:

In preparing the plans for the North Torrance School the Board of Education worked on the theory that all parents want the best education possible for their children. Good fully equipped, modern schools are a prerequisite. The members of the board, teachers, school administrators, and helpful parents suggested many ideas which were included in the North Torrance plans.

"Many of these items," Hull continued, "were later found to be 'nice to have' but not essential to a truly well designed school. It was these 'extras' such as wide sidewalks, passage ways, large paved areas, and fancy electrical and plumbing fixtures which were pared from the funds allocated for the construction of the North Torrance School."

Dr. Howard A. Wood, president of the board stated that by careful study and reconsideration the board was able to safely cut the cost of the new school \$28500 without jeopardizing the education of any Torrance school child.

"Nothing was cut that would endanger any child's health, such as reducing the amount of light, or lessening the required strength of steel beams. Only some of the 'extras' were eliminated," Dr. Wood said.

In the case of the North Torrance site the time element was in our favor. In the case of the Seaside Rancho school we were racing against time to complete the school by September. Any delay in the plans for that school would have meant that temporary quarters would have to have been provided at an expense that would have eaten away at the savings that we would have been able to effect by reconsidering the Seaside School plans as we did in the case of the North Torrance School.

"We hope that the residents of North Torrance realize that nothing was sliced from the North Torrance School which would in any way place the health, the welfare, the education or the happiness of the children of those parents in jeopardy," Dr. Hull stated.

Decline in Area Unemployment Noted by CSES

Unemployment, or at least the number of persons applying for a job, has taken a "dip" according to Mrs. Winona Ellis, manager of the Torrance office of the California State Employment Service.

Since April of this year the number of person seeking job information from the local CSES office, 1628 Cravens avenue, has declined in most classifications with the exception of "service" classification which includes practical nurses, cooks, waitresses, janitors, and similar jobs.

As of this date there are 896 residents of the Torrance area reporting for unemployment assistance as against 1055 in April, Mrs. Ellis said.

The Torrance area is bounded by Rosecrans boulevard on the north, Figueroa street on the east, Palos Verdes Drive on the south, and the ocean front on the west.
