

GROUNDBREAKING SET FOR \$33,000 BAKERY

Alma's Bakery, reknown for lavishly decorated cakes, will break ground for a new \$33,000 bakery and apartment building at Carson street and Andreo avenue this week, according to Mrs. Alma Schultz, owner.

The two-story structure will house an 18-stool fountain lunch counter and retail bakery goods store in the front of the building. The rear portion will house the baking room.

Upstairs of the concrete block structure is designed in such a manner that the space can be used for six apartments or of the space.

The building will be located on the street at 1954 Carson street, from the present store, a parking area of 70 by 45 feet, an equal area as that of the building will be provided for the owner said.

Associated with Mrs. Schultz in the management of the bakery are her husband John, a son, Ernest and a daughter, Mary. The family came to Torrance about seven years ago. They live at 2012 Andreo avenue.

When completed Mrs. Schultz will specialize in decorated cakes for weddings and special occasions. Cookies, coffee cake and

bread also will be featured. The building is expected to be completed in approximately five months.


'Oil Is Where' Cast Adds Names
