Your Library Recommends

IN SEARCH OF A FUTURE by MAURICE HINDUS. Now that the State of Israel has been firmly established in the Middle East and started to make peace with its neighbors, the most important question is its relationship with the Arab and Moslem states that surround it. The author, a journalistic observer of intelligence, made a journey of some length which has resulted in this account and the conclusion that the achievements of Agriculture in Palestine is a historic event, a turning point in the history of the Middle East.

HEAT OF THE DAY by ELIZABETH BOWEN. An admirable novel in which the suspense and secrecy of war time make the drama. It is the story of a woman of more than ordinary beauty and goodness and a man of strong but wrongly developed character; each is the great love of the other's life. He becomes a traitor and she cannot excuse or save him; nor can she care for the patriot who

is worthwhile but by fate unlovable. A very strong study of character with great suspense.

THE NANCY FLYER by ERNEST POOLE. Quite a different tale is this story of stage-coach days, thrilling in its way. It portrays the rivalry between a man and a woman, a Coach and an Inn, Home and the Road. The Nancy Flyer went 80 miles a day behind her six horse team up and down the New Hampshire hills, one of the best coaches driven by the bold and dashing Bob Gale. In those days the coach driver was a heroic figure much like today's air pilot and young Sam who tells the story and his mother Nancy, for whom the Coach was named, are both under the spell of The Inn and The Road.

THE FRANCHISE AFFAIR by Josephine Tey and AFTER MIDNIGHT by Martha Albrand. Both of these are a bit out of the ordinary run of "Who dun it" and worth reading if you like to puzzle your wits.

16TH CENTURY PERSIAN CARPET IS EXHIBITED

A most valuable early 16th century medallion carpet from Northwest Persia, has been given to the Los Angeles County Museum in Exposition Park. This remarkable gift, worth about \$100,000 if a money value can be placed on such a rare piece of art, was presented to the museum by Jean Paul Getty of Tulsa, Okla., and is known as the "Crown Carpet" for in 1902 it was lent for the coronation of King Edward VII of England in Westminster Abbey. It was laid in front of the throne and may clearly be recognized in a painting of the coronation by Edwin Abbey, R.A., now in Buckingham Palace.

The carpet belongs to the greatest and best period of Persian carpet weaving and compares in value and importance to a Rembrandt in European art. It is one of the twelve out-
