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

Unemployed Receive Compensation in Cash; No Checks

Cash, not checks, now await persons who draw unemployment compensation from the Torrance branch of the California State Employment Service, announced Mrs. Winona Ellis, manager of the local office.

The payments in cash, which started last week will save time for those receiving payment, and will save taxpayers money by eliminating the printing of thousands of checks; plus the time in making them out, and the danger of forgery or theft of checks, according to Mrs. Ellis.

Police did not welcome the announcement, as it will mean a close watch for them at all times because of the large amounts of money to be kept in the safe. However most of the cash will be delivered daily in an armored car, it was reported.

Market Operators Join Directors On HAEC Bond

Thomas K. Ware, Gardena, and James E. Wagner, San Pedro, have been elected to the Board of Directors of the Harbor Area Employers' Council it was announced today.

Food Market operators, each also will serve on the executive committee of the food division of the Employers' Council, according to Frank S. Selover, executive secretary.

Ware, proprietor of the Valley Food Market, Gardena, is past president and director of the California Retail Grocers Association, president of the Southern California Retail Grocers Association, and director of Certified Grocers of California, Ltd. Wagner is one of the proprietors of the Wagner markets in San Pedro, and Long Beach, identified with civic affairs and activities among market owners in the harbor area.

Realizing the need for joint employer action to bring about permanent industrial peace in the harbor area, both Ware and Wagner long have been identified with the Harbor Area Employers' Council. The food and mercantile divisions of the Employers' Council recently were organized to facilitate negotiation of labor contracts.

The food division is planning a concerted drive to enlist all food dealers in the Employers' Council, according to Selover. "In pursuing our objective—peaceful industrial relations in the harbor area—our members are realizing that they have a right to enjoy better than normal growth and prosperity, and that nothing can stop the natural expansion of this vast area with its permanent assets such as its undeveloped residential land, the harbor, and the ocean," Selover said. Nearly 100 per cent of stores involved in Torrance and Lomita are in the Employers' Council now, he pointed out. A substantial portion of San Pedro, Wilmington and Gardena stores also are members.

Other directors are A. J. McCown, president; H. W. Smith, vice president; Harry M. Carr, secretary-treasurer; Cecil Caldwell, Paul Diamond, Leon Ferrer, and C. L. Prow.

Jobs Available for the Highly Skilled

Mrs. Ellis stressed the point that the bulk of these jobs exist in the fields of electronics and aerodynamics and that qualifications required are exceptionally rigid due to the highly technical nature of the work.

Torrance Herald Chosen to Run Special Ads

The Torrance Herald is one of 45 newspapers in the County which have been selected by H. L. Byram, County Tax Collector, to carry advertisements of the forthcoming county-wide sale, beginning AUGUST 1, 1949, of tax-deeded properties in which 2400 parcels will be sold at public auction.

The new county policy of opening a bid with a minimum price of \$10 will be continued, at this sale, the 56th of the series. The properties up for sale have various assessed valuations up to \$1000 each. In every instance, the opening bid will be \$10, Byram said.

Parcels to be sold are located in various sections of the county, with approximately 300 parcels in incorporated cities. About 500 parcels are included in a single tract near Newhall where an oil boom is now rampant.

The sale will be held on the third floor of the Hall of Justice and will be conducted by Deputy Frank B. Murphy, of Alhambra.

Murphy points out that under legislation signed by Gov. Warren the tax moratorium is removed from parcels deeded to the State during the past seven years for tax delinquency, and his office is starting to process about 10,000 of these properties preparatory to offering them for sale. First sale will be in October or November.

The deputy pointed out that a total of more than 90,000 deeded parcels has been reduced to a total now of 30,000, including the 10,000 which are being taken out from under the moratorium, and that he can foresee the day when the normal number will be barely more than 400 or 500 tax-deeded properties eligible for public sale in any one year, as compared with the eight to ten thousand which have been put on the market at tax auction, each year during recent years.

Scientists' Topic Is 'Sacrament'

"Sacrament" will be the Sunday Lesson-Sermon subject in all branches of The Mother Church, The First Church of Christ, Scientist, in Boston. The Golden Text is from Matthew: "Thou, when thou prayest, enter into thy closet, and when thou hast shut thy door, pray to thy Father which is in secret; and thy Father which seeth in secret shall reward thee openly."

Council Opens Way for Seaside Shopping Center

Mirroring Torrance's growth, the City Council has approved an amendment to the zoning laws which will permit construction of a business district near Seaside Ranch.

Under plans advanced by Ben Haggott, developer, neighborhood shopping district would be established on property within a 175-foot frontage on Pacific Coast Highway, immediately east of Seaside Heights and Seaside Ranches.

The council also has approved a tract map for a new subdivision in the Weston Ranch. The development will be located on Pacific Coast Highway, between Lomita and Walteria.

Baptist Church Will Hold Daily Bible School

The First Baptist Church will hold its Vacation Bible School from July 18 through July 29, announced the Rev. Robert H. Coburn, assistant pastor.

The school, which will begin at 9:15 a. m. each week day except Saturday and Sunday, will be open to all boys and girls in Torrance.

Laura Thomas and Irene Mills will supervise the school, said Rev. Coburn.

Buses will be provided to pick up any children not living close enough to walk, Rev. Coburn stated.

Supervisors Withhold Action On Taxi Deal

The Board of Supervisors Tuesday postponed adoption of an ordinance which would have allowed the Yellow-Cab Company to send its entire fleet into unincorporated territory in part payment of \$2 a year per cab.

Preparation of the ordinance had been voted earlier, and the action Tuesday followed arguments by board members John Anson Ford and Raymond V. Darby that independent taxi operators might be forced out of business by the measure.

It was pointed out that independent operators who are not licensed to operate in Los Angeles city and those who depend on West Hollywood business, would be especially hard hit.

The proposed ordinance permits Yellow Cabs bringing fares into West Hollywood section to pick up return passengers by payment of a \$2 fee. Cabs with stands in unincorporated territory are now licensed at \$10 a year.
