WHITNEY BOY SINGERS APPEAR HERE SUNDAY

During the past 22 years this chorus, with its ever-changing membership but continuous directorship, has played at two world fairs, one international and several national conventions, given concerts in the Hollywood Bowl, and the Rose Festival of Portland, Oregon, said Rev. Mason.

Advice Offered To School-Bound Vet Trainees

Veterans who are thinking about returning to school next fall under either the GI Bill of Rights or State educational assistance programs would do well to take prompt action to get their papers in order, in the opinion of Mrs. Helen K. Dill, director of the Veterans Service Center in Torrance.

"If you're merely continuing a course at the same school you attended last semester, your problems are probably already taken care of," Mrs. Dill said. "But if you're transferring, just starting, or resuming school, or are at or near the end of your Federal entitlement and want to shift over to State aid, there's paper work to be done."

Virtually all of this preliminary documentation, such as certificates of eligibility, can be handled smoothly during the summer months. Waiting until registration time in the fall means getting caught in a rush and possible delay in subsistence checks, Mrs. Dill warned. She reports that interest in the State educational assistance program is growing as more veterans approach the end of their time entitlement under the GI Bill. The state provides payment for tuition, books and supplies, and a living allowance of \$40 a month, up to a maximum expenditure of \$1,000 for any one veteran. To be eligible, a veteran must have been born in or entered service from California, must have discharged under honorable conditions and must have had at least 90 days of service prior to January 1, 1947.
