

POST OFFICE OPENING 'MOVES' ENTIRE KEYSTONE COMMUNITY

Without moving an inch or so much as a stick of furniture residents in the Keystone area discovered last Monday that they are now living in "Carsolon."

The move was strictly in name only, "Carsolon," a contraction of Carson and Avalon, was the name given by the

United States Post Office to the new contract station located in the Avalon Sundries store at 21732 South Avalon boulevard.

The station will be operated by Smith K. Campbell, owner of the store. Instructing Campbell in his new duties last Monday was Torrance's Acting postmaster Louis H. Deiningger. The contract station will handle all postal matters except postal savings bonds, and international money orders, according to Deiningger.

The new station is considered as a sub-station of the Torrance post office and will be serviced by that office.

Pick-up of mail at "Carsolon" will be made at 12 noon and again at 5:30 p.m., Deiningger said. No mail, either in boxes or through the general delivery service, will be distributed at the new station.

In union affairs. This, they stated, has been going on since 1945.

However, they decided to quit the union and now, they charge, the packing houses refuse to sell them any meat, on union order, and they are deprived of their means of earning a livelihood.

They ask for an injunction against the ban placed on them by the union and by packing houses that work in cooperation with the teamsters in this matter. Injunctions against picketing is included in the petition. They stated in their complaint that Les Dayton, secretary-treasurer of the union's local of meat and provision drivers, told them when they were taken into the union.

The international headquarters in the east is not in favor of peddlers joining the union but we decided to let you boys live—so we decided to let you join the union.

Superior Court Judge Clarence M. Hanson issued a temporary restraining order and order to show cause, pending the hearing on the injunction proceedings.



President Truman's fact-finding board appointed to settle the threatened steel strike which would affect some 1500 employees at Columbia Steel Company will open public hearings in New York on July 28.

Chairman Carroll Daugherty said the July 28 date would give both sides ample time to prepare their evidence.

The board will meet two days earlier with representatives of the steel industry and of the CIO United Steelworkers to "arrange for procedural matters."

A discussion early this week had to do with organization of the committee. An executive secretary will be appointed later.
