THIRTEEN STEPS LEAD TO A FLY FREE CITY

After surveying the local fly situation, studying habits of the winged germ-carriers, and talking with top entomologists, your Fly Abatement Committee of Torrance—F.A.C.T., has these suggestions to make for you to follow if you wish to join the city-wide cooperation effort to "Kill a Fly and Save A Life."

1. Obtain water tight, fly tight garbage cans.
2. Put a half inch of water in garbage cans when empty.
3. Newspaper in cans is a natural incubator for flies—leave it out!
4. Cover garbage can with a tight fitting lid immediately after collector has emptied the container.
5. Use metal containers for cans and bottles. Cardboard soaked with spillings form excellent breeding place.
6. Wash cans and bottles before discarding into can barrel.
7. Place lawn cuttings, and other garden clippings in containers to facilitate pickup.
8. Tie bulkier garden cuttings such as small branches in four foot bundles not over one foot in diameter.
9. Remove chicken and rabbit droppings at least twice weekly—spray pens often.
10. Spray outside of house, "paint" screens, walls, porches and other places where flies land before they sweep into your home through an open door.
11. Use an effective, recommended fly spray that will do the job—don't pound a spike with a glass hammer.
12. Block ALL openings however small in all screens.
13. Flies breed in warm moist places—destroy these places by spreading manure piles and heaps of lawn cuttings out in the sun.

Refinery Workers Gain In Drive For Safety Record

Refinery workers at General Petroleum Corporation's Torrance plant last week had passed the three-quarter million man-hour mark without a lost-time accident and were gunning for the long-sought million-hour mark.

Company officials expect the millionth consecutive working hour without an accident to be reached about August 27—if no serious accident happens in the meantime.

A large measure of credit for reminding workers of their safety record was afforded a large electric sign posted near one of the main gates. A green light burns brightly if no lost-time accidents have occurred during the current month. A red light is turned on if the opposite occurs.

Also posted is the number of consecutive man-hours worked without accident.

Maintenance of the sign is part of a company-wide program designed to keep General Petroleum employees safety-minded. Last year, the Torrance plant recorded better than 1,225,000 man-hours without lost-time accident. The company's Vernon manufacturing plant is currently well over 1 1/2 million safe man-hours.

Race Crash Victims Known Here

Repercussion of an Indiana race car accident in which two drivers were killed, was felt in Torrance this week.

While 5000 spectators watched horrified at the Salem half-mile speedway, Chick Barbo, 33, of Huntington Park, and Tommy Mattson, 32, of Wilmington, Del., locked wheels of their powerful Offenhauser racers Sunday afternoon. The cars spun out of control.

Mattson was the son-in-law of Jim Branamen, proprietor of the American Barber Shop, 1511 Cabrillo avenue, who left for the east Monday to attend the driver's funeral services. Chick Barbo, who for a time was sponsored by local interests, was well known to Torrance racing car enthusiasts.

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University Recommends Fly Killer

Writing on the new fly killer Benzene Hexachloride the University of California reported the following:

"This material has given spectacular cleanup of the most severe infestations, where the other materials have been unsatisfactory, and its use has resulted in nearly fly-free premises for periods of three to four weeks. It is considered the most satisfactory of all the materials investigated from the standpoint of complete fly cleanup. Benzene Hexachloride produces a very rapid fly knock-down and is very spectacular in action."

The article was signed by R. L. Metcalf and R. B. Marsh, assistant entomologist and junior entomologist, respectively, of the Citrus Experiment Station, Division of Entomology, Riverside, California.
