Mrs. R. W. Beirdneau has charge of all the flower arrangements, both in their entry and in their placing at the show. Mrs. Beirdneau is the chairman of the Garden Section of the Los Feliz Woman's Club, and membership chairman of the Glendale Branch of the American Begonia Society. Last year she won the Glendale plaque for the best fuchsia garden, given by the California Fuchsia Society.

Besides the lovely dahlias that will be occupying half of the show space, begonias, fuchsias and many cut flowers also will be seen. Plans have been made for two lovely landscaped areas by the Glendale Branch of the American Begonia Society, and the Mountain View Branch of the California Fuchsia Society. Entries are coming in from Torrance, Lomita, Long Beach, Pasadena, Glendale, San Fernando Valley, Monrovia, Altadena, Santa Monica, Beverly Hills, Santa Barbara and other areas.

to bring all specimens in before 10:00 a. m. on Saturday August 13. In sending cut specimens blooms, home gardeners should bring 3 to 5 cut flowers per entry. The same is required for the small vegetables. Pot entries of all kinds will be accepted. Children may bring in small dish gardens, little miniature gardens of any kind and other classifications given on the schedule.
