


# L.A. Cops Bump Arcadia in Drive for Meet Finale with Inglewood

## Former Tartar Grid Great Inks San Jose Contract

Billy Parton, former Tartar gridiron great, has signed with San Jose State College to coach the frosh backfield, according to word received here by his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Coy Parton, of 734 Sartori avenue.

Parton, captain of the Golden Raiders of San Jose in 1948, ended his eligibility last year. Weighing only 155 pounds he was a spectacular ball packer and won honors on the CCAA team and on the Little All-Coast squad.

Parton, playing for Torrance in 1940 and '41, showered himself with football glory. He was named by the All-Southern California board of football as the outstanding high school player of 1940 and was given the Helms Athletic Foundation award. He twice made All-Marine League team.
