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 revealed that the corporate name and organization of the Junior Chamber of Commerce was held by still a third group, presumably sponsored by the senior Chamber.
 On the other hand, Howard J. Percy, newly chosen president of the Junior Chamber, reported that the State and National Chamber organizations had indicated their intentions of granting a charter to his group. It was pointed out, however, that if the new group operated without a corporate set-up, each individual member would be liable for debts, damage suits or other obligations incurred by the unincorporated body.
 Officers of the senior Chamber all expressed themselves as sympathetic with the purpose of the Junior Chamber as outlined by State and National officers, but some of the officers of the senior Chamber expressed doubt as to the methods of some of the present leaders in the local Junior Chamber movement.
 Inasmuch as the by-laws of the Torrance Chamber of Commerce prohibit engaging in any political activities and require that its civic work be confined to activities of interest to the entire community of Torrance—and not just some limited group—it was emphasized by the senior officers that this restriction would have to be included in the by-laws of the Junior organization before it could be sponsored by the senior Chamber.
 A number of the Junior Chamber officers stated that in their opinion their organization had "gotten off on the wrong foot" but that they now wished to correct their mistakes and coordinate their work with the senior Chamber. It was with this idea in mind that the joint committee was chosen to develop a working arrangement between the two civic bodies.
 Present at the Tuesday conference from the Torrance Chamber of Commerce were: Charles Ver Jones, president; W. T. Tillotson, vice-president; Reed H. Parlin, vice-president; Dean L. Sears, treasurer; Blaine Walker, executive secretary; and Bob Haggard, C. T. Rippey, and Grover C. Whyte, directors.
 Representing the Junior Chamber were: Howard J. Percy, president; Harvey Abramson, vice-president; Charles S. Schultz, Jr., John F. Phillips, directors, and Dwight Zubank.

 Some double sessions still will be held at Torrance Elementary School, officials said, although some of the overload of students will be cared for by the addition of two bungalows. The former paint and carpenter shop which served the entire district has been converted to classrooms for Torrance Elementary. An old garage and a pump house at Perry School have been moved in for use of the paint and carpenter shop, Hull stated. This juggling of buildings provided two classrooms at Torrance Elementary at an approximate cost of \$750, he pointed out.
 At the new Seaside school, some double sessions in the elementary grades will be necessary, Hull said, until the final completion of Wing B—expected by Thanksgiving.
 In the meantime, seven units will be used for classrooms, and one for an administration unit in Wing A. When the second wing is completed the students will move into that wing while the asphalt tile is laid in Wing A. It is expected that much of the outside asphalt paving and grass will be in by that time. This will protect the new flooring from the sand and grit tracked onto the new flooring officials claim.
 Double sessions will end with the completion of both wings.
 Fern Avenue's new construction, one kindergarten unit and two classrooms will be ready by Monday, Hull said. No double sessions at Fern avenue will be necessary.
 Three classroom units and a lavatory now in the final stages of construction at Perry School also will be ready for the opening of fall sessions.
 Bids for the new North Torrance school will be opened September 16. With the rainy season ahead it is doubtful if the North Torrance school will be used this year.
 Meanwhile, as kids in the Waveria area prepared for the reopening of the old school, officials reported that plans for the new school are nearly complete. Hull met last week with Charles Gibson of the State Division of Architecture, to work out final details for the new school.
 Final approval of the plans for the new service unit have been approved. Bids for the construction of the unit will be called for shortly, Hull indicated.
