A Mystery? Broken Pipe Line Unclaimed

Who owns the propane line which sprung a leak last Friday morning at 213th and Bolsa Streets in the North Keystone Section is somewhat of a mystery.

The sheriff's report says Standard Oil owns the line, but Standard Oil denies this; one report said that General Petroleum controls the line while another was that it belongs to Southern California Gas Company; General Petroleum claimed that Shell-Oil Company owns the line, but Shell denies this, asserting that General Petroleum controls the pipe section.

Regardless of who owns the line, it broke open and spewed thousands of cubic feet of gas into the air. The adjacent highway was blocked off until workers succeeded in shutting off the line.

Equipment from the local Fire Station No. 36 stood by in case of an emergency. Sheriff's deputies said that if the gas had been ignited, the resultant explosion would have created havoc over a wide area.

E. K. Mortimer Substitutes For Capt. Bartlett

E. K. Mortimer is acting captain at the local fire station at 404 E Carson street during the absence of Capt. Jesse Bartlett.

Capt. Bartlett has been away from engine No. 36 since a freak accident on August 1st when the door of the fire station fell down as the engine was going out on call, and hit the captain across the wrist and arm. Several tendons in his wrist were injured and he is only now beginning to recover the use of his hand.

Capt. Bartlett is expected back at the station on October 4th, after his regular vacation period is over, and by that time his hand should be completely well. Acting Captain Mortimer told your reporter this week.

Modern Methods Pre-fab Construction to be Used for Alondra Park Community Hall

Above-ground construction on wall panels are poured and have dried, an assembly crew together with a crane will report to Alondra Park where even now, foundations for the building are being completed.

The assemblers will—with the help of "Big Friend," the crane—pick up the huge arches, roof and wall panels, tack weld them into place, and when the last section has been added, make the whole structure secure by a permanent weld.

The community auditorium, financed by the County Department of Parks and Recreation, will contain some 8000 square feet of floor space. A stage will occupy one end of

the building. Biggest portion of the space will be utilized for a large activity room. Here, facilities will be available for dancing, volleyball, badminton, and other indoor sports, the activity room can be used for a public meeting or can be used for a banquet room.

At the other end of the building, floor space will be used for the installation of kitchen and locker and shower room facilities. The building, complete with furnishings, is expected to be completed this year.

Parents Return To School Also

Banning evening school was among the 23 adult schools offering an expanded day and evening program for men and women under the direction of the Los Angeles City Board of Education, beginning last Monday, September 12th.

Courses in everything from typewriting and dressmaking to business management and psychology are offered in the various adult centers. There are many courses in vocational education, such as shop work in cabinet making, blueprint reading, mechanical drawing, radio repair and television. Along with these are the classes in basic skills, reading, writing, public speaking, English, languages and history.

Counseling and advisement services are available in all schools for adults. Those who have educational or vocational problems or want information requirements, occupational opportunities, or personality adjustment may talk over their problems with a trained counselor. A testing service is also available to all students.

According to E. Manfred Evans, Supervisor of Adult Education Branch, schools for adults with modern facilities, equipment, and well-trained teachers operate to serve the needs of the community. There is no charge for instruction.

Sullivan is a former assistant U. S. Postmaster and bigwig in the Democratic Party's National Organization.
