The Torrance Bee gridders employed a sparkling ground and air assault to score a thumping 28 to 0 win over the Rosemead Bees at the latter's field Thursday afternoon.

The local high school lightweights started a concerted touchdown march midway in the first quarter only to lose the ball on downs while perched on the Rosemead 14-yard stripe. However after the quarter period, Rosemead fumbled deep in their own territory to set up the Torrance score.

After racking up a first down on the Rosemead 4, Tad Mimura bucked over for the first TD. John Ford plunged over for the first of his four extra points.

Later in the quarter, Lefty Schol darted 55 yards around left end for another touchdown.

The fleet fullback traversed the game and in the final frame, which together with a 49-yard pass from Bill Crawford to Tom Giatras, ran the score up to 28.

Playing heads up defensive ball, the maroon and gray were never in trouble.

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FOG, FUMBLES PLAGUE EL CAMINO AS ORANGE TAKES OPENER, 18-0

The breaks—usually some-thing that the winning team and the losing team doesn't happen according to formula Saturday night when Coach Amby Schindler's El Camino Warriors dropped their first contest of the current season to a rugged Orange Coast varsity, 18-0.

Encouraged by a hard charging, stubborn line, the Warriors put up a creditable showing marred by only three miscues. But those were enough for an alert Orange backfield, who pushed across touchdowns in the first, third and fourth quarters.

The contest generally was marred by constant fumbles on both sides, resulting from fog and failure of the lighting system.

After Orange kicked off to open the contest, El Camino, on the second running play, fumbled with the Pirates recovering on the Camino 21. Six plays later Claude Cook swept right end from the Warrior four for the first touchdown. The try for an extra point failed and Orange held a 6-0 lead at halftime.

With the time running out in the third stanza, Orange Coast intercepted a pass from Jim Sears to set up the second score. Moments later Glen Butler, on a double reverse, hit paydirt for another Pirate T.D. Once again

the extra point conversion was wide.

Midway in the final quarter Larry Willoughby climaxed a 90-yard drive going over from the Warrior 5. The touchdown march was set up by a 65-yard pass interception. The Warrior linemen charged the place kicker to block the extra point and the game ended with Orange Coast on the heavy end of an 18-0 count.

The Warriors lost several scoring opportunities when the Pirates fumbled within their own 40 during the second half. A strong line, however, held the Alondra Park eleven scoreless.
