Adopting the slogan "Freedom Goes Where the Newspaper Goes" as the theme, editors and publishers throughout the nation will observe the week of October 1-8 as "National Newspaper Week."

The observance marks the tenth anniversary of the event. Pointing to the battle waged by the American press against despotism, intolerance, and corruption, Governor Earl Warren has proclaimed the week in California as "Newspaper Week."

In his proclamation the Governor stated: "The future of America depends upon its continued vigilance, and upon public understanding of the vital importance of the service which the newspaper renders."

He urged the people of the state to familiarize themselves with the newspaper services and facilities of their own communities to the end that they may better understand the part which the press plays in their daily lives.

COUNCIL 'FARES WELL' IN BID TRANSACTIONS

Swapping bids Tuesday night the City Council came out about even in deals involving the Torrance Municipal Airport and the North Torrance fire station.

On the receiving side of the ledger the council accepted a recommendation of the city manager to accept a bid of \$6000

per year for the right to farm the lands adjacent to the landing strip at the city airport. The bid was tendered by A. P. Wright of Los Angeles.

In previous years the farming rights were let for approximately \$1500.

On the spending side of the ledger the City Dads doled out \$5,588 to Arnold Schleuinger of 829 Loma Vista, El Segundo, for the construction of the new fire house for North Torrance.

All other bids, nearly a dozen, and ranging from Schleuinger's low bid to one of more than \$9000 were rejected in accordance with the recommendation from George Stevens, city manager.

Two other bids were accepted during the meeting:

B. F. Goodrich Tire Company's bid of \$,0087 per mile for the rental of bus line tires.

Offer of Mrs. M. Banks to operate the Los Angeles Terminal of the Torrance Bus Lines for another year with the option to renew at the end of the year as specified in the current contract.

Among the other recommendations of the city manager which received the approval of the council were the following:

1. That Earl Russell be temporarily employed as a Laborer, effective August 29, 1949, at a compensation of \$184 per month.

2. That W. C. Campbell be temporarily employed as Custodian, effective September 27, 1949, at a compensation of \$176.

3. That the Police Chief be authorized to attend a Peace Officers Convention in Sacramento October 4 to 9, 1949, inclusive, with appropriate expenses paid.

APPROPRIATIONS
1. For the purchase of a radio unit for North Torrance Fire Engine, the sum of \$428.50 plus tax, (budget item).

2. To the Chamber of Commerce for publicity and advertising for July, August and September, the sum of \$1,250, (budget item).

3. To the Barclay Survey Company for survey services during the month of August, the sum of \$260.

4. To the Lund Company for additional premiums, as a result of final audit, for Comprehensive Liability and Fire and Theft on City Fleet, for the period of July 1948 to July 1949, the sum of \$367.37.

5. For the renewal of Liability Insurance for Airport, the sum of \$132.40, (from Airport
