"Boost Your Town—It Boosts You," theme for the 22nd National Business Women's Week to be observed October 9-15 by Business and Professional Women's Clubs underlies all activities of the California Federation and its 15,159 members. This was brought out by Mrs. David E. Fulwider, state president, in commenting on the state-wide observance of this event, traditional time for members to make known their desire to work with and for all civic groups.

"Recognizing our economic responsibility to ourselves and to our communities, we have in California three specific projects that can be adapted for study and discussion by clubs and their communities," Mrs. Fulwider said. These are: (1) Small business clinics, to give women with money-making ideas the know-how that will minimize financial risks. (2) The employment security and referral plan, which aims at getting the right woman in the right job. (3) An investment and savings study program to encourage women to put money to work to provide financial freedom during productive years and security after retirement. Through the cooperation of the
