FIFTEEN FOUR-YEAR OLDS TO START IN \$100,000 MATURITY


Santa Anita Park's new major fixture in world racing—the \$100,000 Maturity, exclusively for four-year-olds—is scheduled for its auspicious inaugural Jan. 31. Los Angeles Turf Club, Inc., is making preparations to handle a crowd almost as large as the turnouts that will be on hand for the other Santa Anita "hundred granders"—The Handicap on Feb. 28 and The Derby on March 6.
Fifteen outstanding contenders out of the original nomination list of 46, have been checked by Racing Secretary W. A. Everett as having qualified as starters. California will predominate with representation but sectional interest will be furnished by candidates from Canada, New Jersey, Louisiana, Rhode Island, Delaware and Texas.
There are four or five other possible starters, but it is figured that the \$250 fee to enter and the \$1,500 additional to start will hold the field to solid contention.

Cee and Dee Tartar Teams Beat Leuzinger

The Cee and Dee hoopsters of Torrance High met the Leuzinger quint on the local hardwood last Friday afternoon and sent them home with losses of 23-16 for the Cees and 18-14 for the Dees.
Tartar's Cees in their third win in five games set back the Leuzinger Olympians in a hot contest 23-16 before an excited crowd.
The game fired off with "Wimpy" Chambers setting the fans yelling by sinking two quick baskets in the first two minutes of the game, followed by a free throw for a 5-2 first quarter. The red and gray really turned on the steam in the second and took a large lead over the Leuzinger five.
Captain "Lefty" Scholl, set the pace in the third and fourth quarters with a tip-in and four tallies for his total score of six points and the top scoring honors for Torrance.
The Olympians' points were made mostly on long shots as a tight Tartar defense held them away from the bucket.
Leuzinger's scoring honors went to House, a class center and a real half court artist, who sank 10 of his squad's 16 tallies.
DEES WIN
The Dees of Torrance, in a great defensive game, nosed out the Leuzinger court men by a score of 18-14 in a hot and fast game that was nearly a repetition of the Cee game.
Dan Wright started the fire with two chalkers in the opening minutes. Both teams were a little off the hoop in the first half with Torrance holding a slight edge of 6-4. In the third period Leuzinger broke the Tartar's defense and zoomed to a 12-8 lead. Then Torrance, with great team work, rallied in the fourth with Smith and Berg of Torrance each tallying to tie up the ball game. Lee tossed one to make it a Torrance lead, but Leuzinger came back and tied it up again. In the closing seconds Smith and Kobashi racked up two more digits apiece to pocket the contest for Torrance.
Nine of the Tartar's 18 points were scored in the fourth quarter rally.
Red and Gray scoring laurels were shared three ways with Wright, Berg and Smith each marking four digits. Plunk, of Leuzinger, also dropped two buckets to top the Olympians squad.
