### Ancient Art Exhibition

One of the most important exhibitions ever witnessed on the west coast of ancient works of art from Egypt, Greece, Rome, the Near and Far East, especially China, opened Jan. 20 to the public at the Los Angeles County museum in Exposition Park.

After months of preparation and construction the exhibition, comprising the museum's permanent collection of ancient art, supplemented by important loan material, has been installed in a newly built gallery near the entrance on the first floor of the museum. Arrangement of the exhibition was under the supervision of Henry Trubner, the museum's curator of Oriental Art.

### State Aid Is Available To Vets Survivors

Many children of veterans who died as a result of war service do not realize that they may be entitled to financial assistance from the State of California while attending high school and college, in addition to any federal compensation they may be receiving, J. G. Caldwell, director of the Torrance Area Veterans Service Center, said today.

State aid of \$20 a month for high school or \$40 a month for college or trade school is provided by the State Veterans Dependents Educational Act. This assistance also is available to widows of deceased veterans under certain circumstances.

Those eligible are widows and children of servicemen who were killed in service during either world war, or who died later as a result of a war service connected disability.

The serviceman need not have entered service from California, but the widow or child must have resided in the state for five years at the time of application. A child is eligible to apply only between the ages of 16 and 21, but once approved may continue to receive benefits after the maximum age.

Caldwell urged widows and children of deceased veterans to call at the Torrance Area Veterans Service Center located at 1380 Post avenue for a full explanation of the state educational act as well as the numerous other benefits offered veterans' survivors by federal and state law.

### Geneva Mill To Supply Columbia Unit In Torrance

Construction work at the Geneva Plate Mill Conversion project, to provide facilities for the manufacture of light gauge flat rolled steel in hot rolled coils, will begin in February, it was announced by Dr. Walther Mathesius, president, Geneva Steel Company, U. S. Steel subsidiary.

This is the first major conversion of the plant facilities to additional peacetime uses announced by United States Steel when it purchased Geneva from the government. Not less than \$18,600,000 was pledged at that time to be spent for conversion work.

The hot rolled coils will be further converted into cold rolled sheets and tin plate in new cold reduction mills of Columbia Steel Company.

One of these mills is nearing completion at Pittsburg, California and will eventually use 386,000 tons of these coils annually from Geneva. Another cold reduction mill of 300,000 tons annual capacity is about to be built in Torrance, at the Alcoa plant.

Geneva Steel Company will continue to manufacture plates and structural shapes while the conversion is going on and after it is completed.

It is estimated that the conversion work will permit the rolling of coils by the end of this year.

### Chinchilla Show Soon

Willard George of Los Angeles, Abe Permak of Denver and Jack Veasey of New York, fur experts, have been chosen as judges for the 5th annual Chinchilla Show to be held here Feb. 21-22.

In announcing appointment of the judges, the California Chinchilla Ranchers Club, sponsors of the show, said that early entries indicated that more than 300 live animals would compete.

The show this year, to be held in the State Exposition Building, Exposition Park, Los Angeles, will mark the 25th anniversary of the \$20,000,000 Chinchilla raising industry. The first animals were brought here from Chile on Feb. 22, 1923.

### J. N. LIND IS PROMOTED BY NATIONAL SUPPLY

J. N. Lind has been promoted to assistant general traffic manager of The National Supply Company, according to an announcement by C. R. Barton, vice president of the company. He will make his headquarters in the Grant Building, Pittsburgh, Pa.

Lind started working with the company in 1926 as a clerk in the traffic department, Ambridge. He served in the capacity of assistant traffic manager of the Spang-Chalfant Division of The National Supply Company from 1937 until 1945, when he was promoted to traffic manager of the division.
