### Salvation Army Aids Filipinos After Typhoon

Continued reports concerning pitiful conditions in the Philippine Islands areas recently devastated by typhoons have caused the Social Service Department of the Salvation Army to swing into action in a widespread effort to provide destitute and suffering Filipinos in those sections with clothing and shoes.

"The need is great and immediate," according to Lt. Col. Sydney L. Cooke, Social Service Department secretary for the entire Western Territory, who came to Long Beach this week from his headquarters in San Francisco for a conference with the District Manager of the department here, Major Orlo Ellison.

"We are calling attention of the public to the wide and almost complete havoc caused by the winds and floods in the Philippines, where a vast number of families lost virtually all their possessions.

"We are asking for prompt and generous contributions of light or medium weight woolen garments, and of shoes. Persons of all ages, from the very young to the very old, need new supplies of wearing apparel. The Salvation Army will collect these contributions, sort and pack them, and ship them to the Philippines as rapidly as possible, as an entirely free service. We propose to continue collections and shipments until their emergency needs are met. Long Beach is known for its humane and ready responses to such appeals.

Major Ellison stated that Salvation Army trucks will be sent as rapidly as possible to all homes or places of business to collect such contributions, in response to telephone calls. The telephone number for Torrance is 1356.

### 2789 PERSONS NEEDING JOBS IN LOCAL AREA

According to Winona Ellis, manager of the Torrance area office of the California State Employment Service, which has jurisdiction over Torrance, Lomita, Gardena, Redondo Beach and a number of other cities, there are some 2789 persons unemployed in this area. Of the number asking for work, 918 are women and 1,871 are men. Half of the total are veterans.

There are 669 managerial, clerical, sales (including teachers, office and sales managers, engineers, musicians, photographers, stenographers, typists, sales clerks, general office clerks, bookkeepers, receptionists and P.B.X. operators), on the lists as well as 414 in service trades (includes bartenders, household workers, janitors, waitresses, cooks, bus boys and dishwashers).

Also 408 skilled workers (includes arc, acetylene and combination welders, bakers, rough and finish carpenters, electricians, cement finishers, riggers, marine, bench and shop machinists and fitters) are looking for jobs.

There are 637 semi-skilled (includes truck drivers, sub-assemblers, service station attendants, power sewing machine operators, engine lathe operators, drill press operators, milling machine operators and various other shop and construction trades) on the lists, and 401 unskilled (experienced in simple routine jobs).

Some 60 agricultural workers (includes pickers, dairymen, milkers and various crop workers) are available.

### L.A. Rapid Rail Transit Lines Need Unification

An organization similar, perhaps, to the Metropolitan Water District will be necessary to achieve the goal of mass rail, rapid transportation in Los Angeles County's metropolitan area, LeRoy M. Edwards, chairman of the Los Angeles Chamber of Commerce Rapid Transit Action, said yesterday.

"It is apparently a unanimous opinion that transportation facilities in the area are not satisfactory. We believe fast, convenient, safe transportation may be provided only on rails. And we think automobile freeways will offer excellent rights-of-way," Edwards declared.

"But to acquire such transportation, the same unanimity of purpose must be shown as achieved construction of our magnificent artificial harbor, the Owens river aqueduct, and our Colorado river water system.

"As a matter of fact, it is apparent now that in order to secure rapid transportation facilities, it will probably be necessary to form a district similar to the Metropolitan Water District, participation in which would be decided by a vote of the people.

"These problems have been the subject of an intensive study by a finance committee under the chairmanship of James L. Beebe, Los Angeles attorney and former president of the Los Angeles Chamber of Commerce," Edwards said.

The Beebe committee is in the process of completing financial plans and legislation to be offered the Legislature which could permit formation of a transportation district.

### FROZEN PORK RANCID AFTER SIX MONTHS IS EXPERT'S CLAIM

Frozen pork will begin to lose its fine flavor within five or six months after freezing because the fat will gradually become rancid. Mrs. Margaret Todd, home demonstration agent in Los Angeles county, also says ground meat will lose some of its flavor if held frozen more than two or three months.

Beef, veal, poultry and rabbits may safely be kept in freezing storage lockers from 9 to 12 months. In no instance will longer storage be dangerous to health. The only factor is loss of flavor, she states.

Families who want to know about preservation of home produced meat can obtain a leaflet from Mrs. Todd's office in which are full directions. The leaflet is free and should be requested from the Agricultural Extension Service, 808 N. Spring St., Los Angeles 12.

### Verdict Approved By Supervisors

Unanimous approval of a Supreme Court settlement of the Arizona-California dispute over Colorado River water and opposition to the proposed Arizona diversion project has been voted by the Board of Supervisors of Los Angeles county, the Colorado River Association announced today.

The resolution, introduced by Supervisor William A. Smith, denounced "attempts now being made to divert to Arizona large amounts of water from Southern California's legally established rights on the lower Colorado river."
