Busby had his first competitive fight under State boxing laws at the Bowl last weekend, winning over Bert Herrera of Anaheim by kyo in the second round, and will fight Al Johnson of San Bernardino in one of the features tomorrow.

Busby resides on Narbonne boulevard in Lomita, weighs 164 pounds, and handles his fistic weapons much like the famed middleweight champion of the world, Gorilla Jones, according to Promotor-matchmaker Joe Craig, who has been training Busby during the past few weeks. Busby was overseas with the Navy and received his discharge within the past few months.


