Long Beach Relays To Be On March 13

A preview of the far western candidates for the 1948 United States Olympic Games team, and a full array of more than 800 athletes from high schools, colleges and athletic clubs of the Pacific Southwest, will be the super track and field bill which will revive the Long Beach relays after a wartime dormancy at the Wilson High Stephens Field oval here Saturday, March 13.

All of the leading athletic institutions of the Pacific Coast will compete including full team entries from U.S.C. led by Dean Cromwell, U. S. Olympic Games Coach, Los Angeles A.C., San Francisco Olympic Club, San Jose State, San Diego State, Fresno State and Arizona State of Tempe, and U.C.L.A. varsity of Westwood.

Standout Olympic Games candidates who will be spotlighted competition—the opening preliminary heats being billed for 12:15 p.m.—will be Dr. Steve Seymour, American record holder in the javelin at 248 ft. 10 in., representing Los Angeles A.C., along with Bobby Peoples, Relay record holder in the javelin, the L.A.A.C.'s national A.A.U. mile relay champions, who have been augmented by Cliff Boulton and Eddie Keens of U.S.C. and John Fulten of Stanford, Willie Steele of San Diego State, national I.C. 2A broad jump champion for 1947 at 26 ft. 6 in., and many others.

Danny Busby, Lomita, In Bowl Friday Night

Danny Busby of Lomita, a power-hitting middleweight just out of the Marines who in his only two fights as an amateur at the Wilmington Bowl has scored kayoes, gets his chance to step into the spotlight at the Harbor arena tomorrow night during the weekly amateur fight show.

Busby will engage veteran Van Byrd of Los Angeles in the semi-main event, which is headed by a double light-weight main event, and which Promoter-Matchmaker Joe Craig already is rating one of his best this season.

Tony Contreras, popular but unorthodox Wilmington light-weight, takes on Al Santina of East Los Angeles, runner-up recently for the Southern California Golden Gloves title at Hollywood, and Dino Burns of Long Beach, rated one of the most promising young light-weights in the area, meets Bob Torrence in the double main event.

Busby, though, is being watched with much interest along fight row. He has trained down to 157-14 less than he carried just a month ago; he has had just two fights, and won both, by kayo, and looks every inch the part of a coming contender.

If he gets over Byrd tomorrow, Craig has promised him main event billing. Another strong supporting card, the first preliminary beginning at 8:30 p.m., has been arranged with such boys as Ray Girard, former Poly High athlete; Phil Busty, Tino Ferrera, Mel Sanchez and others in action.

RUHS Beats Leuzinger
