National Hike In Insurance Rates Felt Here

Automobile liability and property damage insurance rates increased as high as 30 percent this week, Russell Lund, local insurance broker states.

"Torrance and several adjacent bay cities have been boosted up to the same rate levels as Metropolitan Los Angeles, which further accentuates our local rate increase," Lund said.

The National Bureau of Casualty Underwriters announced rate increases in California and several other states, based on claims experience.

Drivers under 25 years of age were placed in a special rate classification because they were involved in 25 percent of the nation's accidents last year.

Collision insurance rates, which are those covering damage to one's own automobile, will be unchanged.
