TO OPEN LOS ANGELES SEASON**

More than 300 artists, singers, heard in Los Angeles. Its first members of the ballet and musicians, direct from the Metropolitan Opera House in New York are headed for Los Angeles, where the Metropolitan Opera Association will open its local season of 14 operas in Shrine Auditorium on April 13.

Rise Stevens, Nadine Conner, Ezio Pinza, Salvatore Baccaloni, Lauritz Melchior, Set Svanholm, Blanche Thebom, Helen Traubel, Frederick Jagel, Polyna Stokas, Regina Resnik, Jan Peerce, Bidu Sayago, Jussi Bjöerling, Charles Kullman, Stella Roman, Dorothy Kirsten, Leonard Warren, Alessio de Paolis, George Cehanovsky, Jerome Hines, are just a few of the top ranking operatic stars to sing here during the mammoth two week season.

With Rise Stevens in the title role Bizet's opera masterpiece, "Carmen" will open the season. The season includes "Die Walkure" on April 14; "Peter Grimes" April 15; "Il Trovatore," April 16; "Der Rosenkavalier" the matinee of April 17 and "La Boheme" the evening of the 17th.

"Aida" will be sung Sunday afternoon, April 18; "Siegfried," April 19; "Manon," April 20; a special Wednesday matinee of "Madame Butterfly," April 21; "Masked Ball," the evening of April 21; the double bill "Cavalleria Rusticana" and "Pagliaccio" on April 22; "The Magic Flute," April 23 and the final performance, Saturday afternoon, April 24, of "La Traviata."

This will mark the first time in 43 years that the Metropolitan Opera Association has been heard in Los Angeles.




**Birthday Fete
