The runner on first started down to second, then turned and trotted back to first again, paying no attention to the left fielder who was in the act of dropping the ball. The runner was thrown out trying to get back to second.

This was the second game in two weeks that the Warriors have dropped because of poor baseball. But this game was lost more because of lack of common sense, rather than errors, as was the case the week before.

Plans have been drawn and work has been started on the structure which is scheduled to be in operation in the early part of April. Designed for beauty as well as utility, the new station will be a sleek, streamlined affair housing the ticket office and waiting rooms, and the station platform will have the added protection of porticos extending the full length on either side.

Vets Benefit Under New Civil Service System

The State Department of Veterans Affairs today announced a new procedure whereby veterans and widows of veterans can establish permanent eligibility for preference in state civil service examinations. The former system required a separate application for preference to be filed in connection with each examination. The new procedure, authorized by the 1947 Legislature, will make possible a staff reduction from a peak of 12 employees to three or perhaps two.

The permanent eligibility, however, will apply only to the 10 points preference granted to veterans and veterans' widows in open examinations and the three points in promotional examinations. Those claiming the 15-point preference available to disabled veterans in open examinations still will have to apply for the additional points for each examination. This is due to the language of the law which limits disabled preference to those having a current disability rating of 10 per cent or more, as determined by the U. S. Veterans Administration. To obtain permanent non-

disabled preference, the veteran or widow must apply on the revised form (DSC VP-1, Rev. 1948) to the Division of Service and Coordination, State Department of Veterans Affairs, P.O. Box 1559, Sacramento 7, in connection with the next examination which the applicant desires to take. Copies of the new form are available at offices of the California State Employment Service, State Department of Veterans Affairs, State Personnel Board, County Veterans Service Officers and Community Veterans Service Centers. Once the permanent preference is established, the applicant will be notified by letter.
