W. H. Tolson, Veteran Councilman, Runs Again

Councilman William H. Tolson who has served on the City Council for 10 years, five years as Mayor of Torrance, this week issued a statement of his stand on affairs in Torrance.

The statement follows: "I was first elected to the Torrance City Council in 1934. Since that year numerous civic improvements have been realized, all of which have been very satisfying to the various Council members who have served throughout the years.

"Now we are faced with a greater task than ever before, with civic improvements, the consideration and accomplishment of which require experience and sound thinking on the part of our Council. The growth and development of this area which is substantially indicated to take place within the next two or three years will necessitate additional services, personnel and equipment in our police, fire and other city departments.

"The things needed in Torrance should be taken care of in the next Council term, are too numerous to mention here.

"Some of the most pressing are: "1—Watch the budget, and keep taxes at a minimum. "2—Plan now for the future. Our city is growing, and soon the tail will wag the dog" if we are not careful.

"3—More fire equipment is needed . . . the present equipment is old and becoming obsolete.

"4—More policemen and equipment are needed, also a new police and court building. Police and Fire department employees should be compensated for service over 40 hours per week, comparable with similar service in other departments of the city. Additional men are needed in the Street and Park departments.

"5—More busses are needed, for improved transportation to all of Torrance.

"6—We need a storage room in the rear of our auditorium.

"7—A lot of repairing on our residence streets and alleys is needed.

"8—Highways leading directly to our business districts from the outlying sections of Torrance are important, or else we will be the outlying district soon.

"9—We need sewer mains to serve the North and South portions of Torrance. We need one city-wide water district.

"10—More parks, playgrounds and recreational facilities are needed, including lighting facilities for night activities.

"Every district in Torrance should be kept in close touch with the City Council. This can be done most effectively through the City Manager.

"The Council should, as soon as possible, acquire land in North Torrance, Waveria and Hollywood Riviera for civic buildings, for parks and playgrounds, before these areas are built-up and land costs become very valuable.

"All special funds voted by the people should be used for the specific purposes for which they are voted.

"Functions of a City Manager will make the duties of our Council members more available for increasing city administrative problems.

During the war he served on destroyer escorts in the Atlantic, Caribbean, and Pacific, with his last orders giving him command of a new five-inch gun destroyer escort.
