Rug-Making Is Art Of Local Market Owner

Popularity of amateur rug-making, which now has hundreds of devotees in the South Bay region, has gained new local impetus because of the vividly beautiful rugs made by two Torrance men, Ed Sherrill and Arch Ness, operator of the Torrance Food Market.

Samples of Sherrill's rugs and matching pillows now are on display at the Tiny Tyke Shop in Torrance, where Sherrill will begin a free rug-making instruction class for men and women next Thursday at 7 p.m.

Sherrill and his wife began their hobby 15 years ago in the snowbound Colorado Rockies as a device to kill time. Now he has original designs dating to 1867.

Most designs, he reports, originate from personal experience, such as the distinctive rug he made after witnessing a bull fight in Mexico. Using a simple hook technique which can be learned in a few hours, most novices can make a three by six rug in two or three weeks of their spare time. Cost of materials runs about \$13, although outstandingly beautiful examples have been bid up to \$500. But amateur rug makers are proud of their handiwork; they rarely sell.

LAND ORDERED ACQUIRED FOR DRAINAGE DITCH

Haggard Raps Opponents Of Manager Plan

"I fail to see why any candidate should object to answering questions as to their stand on the City Manager form of government, the elimination of pay of Councilmen and the problem of public gambling halls in Torrance," Bob Haggard, candidate for one of the three positions on the City Council to be filled at the municipal election April 13, said yesterday.

"Further, I fail to see how any candidate can be opposed to any of these three issues on the ballot.

"Certainly it is good business to have an executive trained in the operation of municipal government business at the head of a city the size of Torrance. When \$500,000 a year of the taxpayers' money is being spent, the good sound business judgment of a trained specialist is needed to make every penny go as far as possible. He will save his salary many times over. I think that the City Charter amendment to provide for the City Manager form of government should be adopted by a unanimous vote.

"As to the problem of draw poker halls in Torrance, that bug-a-boo should be eliminated for all time by adoption of the amendment to prevent the licensing of draw poker halls in this city. Yes, we hear rumors of the presence of gamblers' money in Torrance at this time to kill this measure and to back Council candidates. This is evil and the only way to eliminate these rumors is to eliminate the possibility of the gamblers ever getting into Torrance.

"The \$50 a month being paid to Councilmen would be better spent if paid to a City Manager, and I certainly favor that amendment on the ballot and urge its adoption.

"I feel that the recreation funds of the City should be spent for recreation purposes, and that parks and playgrounds should be provided in North Torrance, South and Southwest Torrance and other areas. We should plan ahead. Torrance is a growing city, and parks and recreation should grow with Torrance. I think that a cooperative deal with the schools for joint municipal school playground operation should be worked out."
