

Army Day To Be Observed At Beach City

The following events are scheduled to take place in Long Beach on Army Day, April 6:

Parade: Twelve units in line to march, including two local ROTC units, the Southern California Military Academy, San Diego Military Academy, one National Guard Battalion and units from Ft. MacArthur and Long Beach Air Force Base.

Program at Auditorium: Band concert at 7:30 p.m. to begin a four hour program which will include vaudeville entertainment, special drill teams from the ROTC and the Southern California Military Academy will give fancy drill exhibitions, the speaker will be Lt. Gen. Albert Wedemeyer.

The ceremonies will be climaxed by a mass initiation of nine hundred new members of the Long Beach America Legion Post.

\$30,000 FIRE GUTS FURNITURE WAREHOUSE IN R.B.

Precious refrigerators, washing machines, mattresses and all types of household furnishings were damaged beyond salvage Saturday morning in a raging fire at the South Bay Furniture Co. warehouse, Redondo Beach.

No definite loss statement was available this morning, but the furniture company officials, owner of the warehouse and Redondo Beach Fire Chief Earl Wiltse, believe it was between \$20,000 and \$30,000.

The blaze was first noticed at 12:55 a.m. Thirteen firemen fought the inferno until 7 a.m. before the roaring flames were reduced to smoke. Wiltse stated the fire evidently had been going its merry way for quite some time before it was discovered and firemen summoned. He estimated 90 percent of the jam-packed contents were involved when his department arrived.

CASE NO. 103: Petition of J. E. Kettler for a Change of Zone, affecting all of Tract No. 4838 (known as Kettler Knolls No. 2) bounded on the west by Caballo Ave., on the north by Sepulveda Blvd., on the east by Walnut Ave., and Kettler street to the south. Petitioner desires to reclassify this property from A-1 (Light Agricultural) to R-1 (Single-family Residential), excepting Lot 1, Block 1, which it is desired to rezone to C-1 (Retail Commercial), with a depth of 120 ft. to R-3 (Multiple-family Residential) use.

CRIPPLED H.C. LAD NOW READY FOR PAPER ROUTES

"I'm going to get a paper route in the morning and one in the evening and with my new scooter I can promise speedy and efficient delivery to my customers."

These were the words of a 15-year-old, crippled Harbor City youth Friday as he took possession of a shiny, blue motor scooter presented to him by Harbor City American Legion Post No. 382.

Kenneth Farquhar, who received the gift, lost the use of both legs following an attack of infantile paralysis when he was seven.

Post Commander Hanson made the formal presentation of the specially equipped scooter in a meeting held, appropriately enough, on Good Friday in the Harbor City American Legion hall.

It was as great a jump from horse to automobile for Kenneth, who for the past eight years has had as his choice of transportation a rickety wheelchair or a small two-wheeled scooter which he paddles with one hand pushing against the ground.

When they heard of the youth's plight several months ago, the Legionnaires started a drive to raise the funds and build the scooter.

By staging a series of dances, card parties and auctions, the

Legion raised the \$150 required and the scooter was built through the donated efforts of many persons.

Completely equipped for hand operation, the scooter has a push-button starter; a gear shift along the left hand side of the seat, hand-controlled clutch, accelerator and brakes.

A large box, protected by a removable canvas cover, is mounted in front of the handlebars allowing Kenneth to transport his papers or anything else that he wishes.

"We want to express our thanks to the merchants who donated merchandise to the auction sales, to the service stations who have promised to keep Kenneth supplied with gasoline, to our local barbers who will cut his hair at regular intervals, and to each and every Legionnaire who worked on the project, including the Auxiliary," said Chairman Floyd Pink. "We are now having another of the scooters built for our own Legionnaire Johnny Anderson, who is handicapped due to war injuries. Our Post has made a project of helping others and we are going at it in a big way."
