'Gardena' Mail Hampering Work At El Camino

H. J. Sheffield, director of student personnel at El Camino College, told the Torrance Herald this week that the fact that Gardena postoffice is serving part of the area of Torrance is hampering the registration of students at El Camino.

Sheffield pointed out that students from Torrance in the area served by Gardena automatically give "Gardena" as their address, since they get mail through the Gardena postoffice.

However, Gardena is in Los Angeles Junior College District and not in El Camino, and exchange agreements are necessary in order to permit non-resident students to attend El Camino. During the negotiations for exchange agreements, the discovery is made that the student actually resides in Torrance or within El Camino Junior College District, and they are eligible to attend El Camino.

Use of "Gardena" on Torrance addresses has confused many other residents and business men from Torrance, causing unnecessary delay in mail delivery and subsequent financial loss.

Liquor License Fees To City Total \$1,752

Liquor license fee revenues amounting to \$1,882,454.77, representing the half-year period from July 1, 1947, to December 31, 1947, are soon to be distributed to the cities and counties of the State. This is the 24th such allocation.

This particular allocation made under the change in law effective September 19, 1947, is a mixed nature. The State is retaining one-half of the fees earned in the period of July 1, to September 18, 1947; but of the fees earned from the period of September 19 to December 31, 1947, 100 per cent is being returned to local governments. In all future allocations, 100 per cent of all these license fees will be returned to the local communities.

The current allocation of \$1,882,454.77, Los Angeles county will have returned to its incorporated area \$683,686.07, and to the city of Torrance the amount of \$1,752.50.

CASE NO. 114: Second hearing on the Petition of Wm. J. Caukins Raps Tidwell In Statement

In a strongly worded statement, S. Eugene Caukins, republican candidate for Congress today came out firmly against the policies of Haskel Tidwell and the Retail Clerks Union Local No. 905.

Caukins said, "Fine American firms such as J. C. Penney, Montgomery Ward, Owl Drug, Kress and Woolworth 5 and 10 cent stores have been forced out of business in the San Pedro-Wilmington-Torrance area because of the policies of Mr. Tidwell and his union.
