NEW INJURIES RIDDLE CAMINO TRACK SQUAD

Hit hard by new injuries, Coach Amby Schindler's El Camino cinder squad finished third best in a triangular spike fest with East Los Angeles Junior College and Santa Monica City College last Friday, on the Los Angeles City College oval.

The new injury came to Dick Contreras, sprinter, a quarter-miler. Contreras injured his leg in practice and will probably be out for two weeks.

The Warriors managed to cop two blue ribbons, but not a single second. Little Ray Southstone showed his usual winning form as he sailed to a 12-foot victory in the polevault, Jack Foster brought home winning honors in the 220 lows by skimming over the furling barriers in 25.0.


Wilfred Hanson, who has been improving with every meet, captured a third in the mile, and a fourth in the two-mile, two of the events in which the Warriors have been weakest.

Rodent Control Need Stated By Health Officer

Despite all that has been done to combat the rat, it is still considered man's greatest enemy in the animal world. The rat destroys millions of dollars in property each year. It is estimated that the rat population in Los Angeles county is more than seven million or two rats for each human. At current costs of \$2.75 a year to feed each rat, to say nothing of the destruction they wreak, it is economically unsound to harbor these animals.

Rat proofing or building them out of new and old construction, is the most permanent method of keeping the rat population down. When deprived of food and shelter, they will of course leave.

Holes in roofs, walls, floors and around pipes invite rats as do open ventilators and improperly constructed foundations. Overhead wires and branches and vines afford access to openings above the ground.


Accumulations of rubbish, lumber, and junk in the yard, or under the house are harborage for rodents. Garbage cans with tight fitting lids should be used, and feed for poultry and other domestic animals should be stored in ratproof storerooms or metal bins.


