The United Steel Workers, sources in the union, such a program. This proposal was handed to the industry at the start of negotiations for a "substantial wage increase" earlier in the month. Since United States Steel has taken the lead in rejecting the wage request, it is expected that other companies will follow suit.

Besides the pension proposal, other high lights of the proposed industry-financed program include sickness and accident benefits of \$35 a week for 52 weeks and a \$1500 life insurance policy, hospitalization for each employee and members of his immediate family and to include maternity benefits and surgical fees.

Child Health Week Program is Discussed

With the issuance of the proclamation of the President of the United States setting apart May 1 as Child Health Day, it is in keeping that we review the work that is being done toward making a healthy, happy childhood for these young citizens of tomorrow.

The Los Angeles County Health Department conducts 210 child health conferences each month for the purpose of giving health supervision to children. This includes professional advice to parents concerning the normal growth and development of the infant and young child. This educational service is available to all parents whose children are not receiving this type of service from private physicians.

Immunization against diphtheria, whooping cough, smallpox and tetanus are given to the majority of infants prior to their first birthday.

Preventative dental clinics are conducted in twelve major health centers, where educational instruction, periodic dental supervision, and corrective dental care for certain groups are given.

A dental hygienist gives classroom talks in certain schools in unincorporated territory.

Month examinations are made for children of the kindergarten, first and last grades.

The health department is vitally interested in the normal development of the child even before birth, as well as in the health of the expectant mother. With this in mind, 88 prenatal clinics are held every month in strategic locations throughout the county. Those eligible for care are given complete examinations and advice concerning prenatal problems. Classes for expectant mothers are also held as a part of this program.
