BUSY SUMMER SLATE ON TAP FOR LOMITA PARK

In addition to a sports program involving about 500 participants, 12 special summer recreation events are on the schedule for popular Lomita Park, Director Miss Marjorie Gibson revealed today.

What shapes up as the biggest event on the imposing program is a "community night" featuring a pot-luck supper to be held May 21st, starting at 8:30 p.m.

In order the schedule reads: June 16th, a tables game tournament; June 23rd, a doll show; June 30th, a croquet tournament; July 7, wiener roast and relay races; July 14th, a pet show; July 21st, a throwing and catching contest for boys; July 28th, Girls' Play Day; Aug. 4, a hobby show; Aug. 11, a bowling tournament; Aug. 18, a shuffleboard tournament; Aug. 25th, a marshmallow party.

Hot competition among 24 teams in four boys' and one adult league is in store for park-goers throughout the spring and summer under the direction of Play Leader Lynd Esch.

In addition to the adult softball league, which has drawn

eight closely matched aggregations, two from Torrance, and the rest from the Lomita area, four leagues for boys to 18 years are in operation now. All teams except the peewees (11 years and under) perform two days a week.

Regular craft and dancing classes at the Park reach an attendance peak of nearly 100 children in mid-summer.

To get under way soon at the Eshelman avenue playground is a teen-age program sponsored by the Narbonne High School Parent-Teachers Association and the Lomita American Legion Auxiliary.

These events plus regular organized individual sports, such as carom and shuffleboard, will bid fair to give county-owned Lomita Park a busy time in the second summer of its existence.
