Now On Exhibit At
L. A. County Museum

Eighty-six copper engravings
by Albrecht Durer (1471-1528),
considered the greatest engraver
of all time, are on view at Los
Angeles County Museum thru
May, following the recent show-
ing of 100 of Durer's woodcuts.

The exhibit, lent by a local
collector, includes the "Engraved
Passion" series of 16 prints, 16
compositions of the "Virgin and
Child," several portraits and,
among his best known master-
pieces, "Adam and Eve," "Mel-
ancholia," "St. Jerome in His
Study," which shows the studio
in Durer's house at Nurnberg
destroyed in World War II, and
"The Great Fortune."




