Thugs Attack Civic Leader At San Pedro

 the pair kicking Carr as he lay on the ground.
 Haskell Tidwell, who was attending a state retail clerks union convention in San Diego at the time the beating was in progress, offered a \$1000 reward for information leading to the arrest and conviction of persons attacking Carr.
 "I am offering the reward in behalf of the membership of the clerks' union," Tidwell said. "The beating up of Harry Carr, who is an elderly gentleman, is a disgrace. Sure, we are having an argument with him about the present retail clerks situation, but Harry has been a personal friend of mine for a good many years."
 Informed of Tidwell's offer, Carr said:

"I am sorry but I cannot be complimented by Mr. Tidwell's gesture. I can't seem to place any confidence in the present retail clerks situation, but Harry has been a personal friend of mine for a good many years."
 Carr was the third business man to be beaten during the past two months, since a number of San Pedro and Torrance business men and citizens undertook public criticism of the union's policies. Two years ago Hillman R. Lee, manager of the J. C. Penney Company store in Torrance at that time, was almost fatally beaten by a "goon squad" during the time a dispute was in progress which resulted in closing a number of Torrance stores.

Armed with only meager clues—an incomplete description of the men and the automobile in which they fled—every officer in the San Pedro division joined the hunt.
 Capt. Henry Evans, head of the San Pedro detective bureau, said: "We will do our best to give protection to anyone who has been threatened. The police department is just as indignant over the series of beatings and just as anxious as anyone else to place behind bars the men responsible."
 "This police division is doing everything in its power to bring about the arrest of the assailants," Capt. Evans said he is working on the theory that the hoodlums "have been imported into San Pedro" for the beatings.
