Drive Grosses Band \$7264; Lomita Woman Wins 'Chevy'

When the tumult and the shouting died and the dust of the battle to raise funds for the Torrance Area Youth Band had settled, several newsworthy events stood out from all the rest of the happenings:

Mrs. Anna Enrietta of Lomita won a new Chevrolet; Torrance residents were treated to a cute parade; Two thousand people attended a concert and dance; and The Youth Band fund grossed \$7,264.

Under the "get up and go" of Mrs. John W. Beeman, chairman of the month long campaign, the drive netted nearly \$8000 for uniforms and instruments for the youthful members of the band.

An hour long concert plus a dance on Saturday night, May 15, climaxed the drive and drew one of the largest crowds, if not THE largest crowd ever to jam the Civic auditorium. The band, under the direction of James Van Dyke, participated in a program which was emceed by Tom Hoixie and presented such entertainers and civic leaders as Rosmary DeCamp, movie and radio star; Joan Redding, 14-year-old championship drum major; Mayor J. Hugh Sherley, Jr.; Chief of Police John H. Stroh and Vernon Strange, president of the Torrance Area Youth Band, Inc.

Saturday was a day of music. Besides the stirring marches played by the bands from Long Beach, Redondo Beach, Wilmington and our own band, all at 7 p.m., the All-Girl Pastel Band from Long Beach gave a concert on the steps of the Civic auditorium.

After all the tickets were in and a final count was being taken, one little red-headed member of the band remained among all the grown-ups. He was sitting on his instrument case and was leaning against the wall, first and bored with all the locus poems of talking the ticket sales. He knew apparently that the sponsors had raised enough money for the uniforms and he was waiting for his to take home.

Several of the Seaside Rancho Junior high school students took part in the song and dance festival at the Torrance Junior high school last Friday evening. Martha Gruver and Shirley Parrish were included in the Hungarian dance group; Janet Cash in the Egyptian urn dance and scottische; Patricia Merola in the doll dance, and Ray Parrish, one of the singers in "Whispering." Ellen Morris acted as call girl and helped print the programs.

Members of the newly formed Seaside Ranchos Girl Scout troop have elected their first corps of troop officers, who will serve for six months. Judy Powell is junior patrol leader and Sally Franklin, assistant; Ellen Morris heads the senior patrol and Shirley Parrish is assistant; Patricia Merola is troop treasurer.
