Harbor General Hospital To Benefit Under County Budget

Various Los Angeles county department heads have requested \$60,000,000 in 1948-49 for construction and repairs, Wayne R. Allen, county manager, reported to the Board of Supervisors in his preliminary capital projects budget. Some 540 beds for tubercular patients at Harbor General hospital are included.

However, Allen said he has recommended only \$18,000,000 for such work, \$12,000,000 of which represents financing of proposed new Superior Court building, new Juvenile Hall, new Psychopathic Hospital, cost of new Municipal Court building site, and one public incinerator.

"In addition to the financing of the major projects above listed I am recommending and additional expenditure of 5,856,841 which includes the maximum security unit at Castaic, toilet facilities for beaches, and improvements to parks and recreation areas," Allen said.

Allen explained that his recommended \$18,000,000 fund will be partially matched by state allocations.

BAN ON CARS


