

Registrations For June Poll Number 6623

Democrats continued to maintain in excess of a two-to-one lead over Republicans in Torrance according to final official count of registrations released today. Eligible to vote at the June 1 state-wide primary election in this city will be 4292 Democrats, 1951 Republicans, 221 Independent Progressives, six members of the Prohibition party, 332 electors who declined to state their party affiliations and 21 miscellaneous party registrations.

Total registration in Torrance is 6623, compared to 5538 at the March 4 election, according to

Using the accepted formula of 2 1/2 times the registered vote to compute the population, it is estimated that the present population of Torrance is 16,557. This figure compares closely with the 16,482 figure given by the County Regional Planning Commission three weeks ago.

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Thomas Supporters Predict His Re-Election At June 1 Primary

Heralded as one of the best members of the California State Legislature, and supported for re-election by organized union labor, veterans groups, businessmen and educators, Vincent Thomas, 68th district assemblyman, is expected to be re-elected at the June 1 primaries, his harbor district campaign committee reported this week.

Assemblyman Thomas, who first was elected to office in 1940 and repeatedly has been returned to fill the 68th district seat in the state legislature at Sacramento, this past session became one of the top men in the assembly, bringing distinction to himself and benefits to his district, which includes the Torrance-Lomita-Walteria-Harbor City area, besides the Wilmington and San Pedro districts of Greater Los Angeles and also Catalina Island.

Organized union labor is supporting Thomas, his headquarters reports, because Thomas has dealt fairly with the laboring man's problems, also because he has brought benefits to the important commercial fishing industry which in turn has increased employment in this section.

Businessmen are backing his re-election because he has proved he also understands the business man's problems.

Thomas has gained veterans' support because of his fight and campaign in their behalf in housing and his effort to stamp out gyp finance outfits preying upon veterans.

According to the Thomas group among the endorsements recently received are the United AFL Voters League, Brotherhood of Railway Trainmen, Southern California Businessmen's Association, Affiliate Teachers Organizations of Los Angeles, Los Angeles CIO Council, Democratic Council of Los Angeles, Brotherhood of Firemen, and Locomotive Engineers, California Railway Conductors and Veterans of Foreign Wars, Post 2957.

Sweetwinds, real musical instruments at low cost, are playing an important role in Torrance school music education, according to Abe Milstein, music director for elementary and high schools. Working with Marilyn X. Anderson, Torrance Junior High School music teacher, Milstein gave a demonstration of how they fit in with the local educational program in a recent concert for interested parents and friends of school children.

Students from 4th, 5th and 6th grades showed the value of sweetwinds for initial instrumental music experience as well as basic rhythm instruction. Many of those who started with sweetwind in September are now playing standard instruments in the elementary orchestra, Milstein said.

GOOD PERFORMANCE

The elementary orchestra, most members of which have had no private lessons, gave an outstanding performance when they played three numbers with Milstein directing.

Miss Anderson's Junior High School orchestra showed the result of excellent direction and effort on the part of the students when they played an overture, two waltzes and a march.

The High School orchestra, which has been playing all year for the various high school plays, shows and aud calls is "shaping up" and by next year will be on a par with other fine Southern California high school orchestras. Mr. Milstein and the students are to be commended on their working the orchestra up from "scratch" to the performance of three difficult numbers.

The musical high-spot of the evening was offered by the Junior-Senior High School band, which by its group performance and well knit renditions of popular football and military marches, amply exhibited its ability to represent Torrance High School as a marching band in the coming football season. Torrance should be justly proud of its fine band and should do its part in obtaining uniforms that are as necessary to a fine marching band as the instruments which they play.
