Here is what the lakes are reporting as the end of last week:

Lake Arrowhead: Trout fishing continues good after a most successful opening. The rainbows are averaging 10 to 11 inches. Trollers are doing well with Dave Davis spinners and some fly fishing late afternoons. Biggest fish so far was a 17-inch, two-pounder.

Big Bear Lake: After a poor opening week-end, fishing is improving with fair reports coming in for the last few days. Trolling a small Colorado spinner and still fishing with salmon eggs, produced best results. An 8½ pound trout was caught on a No. 2½ Russelure.

Hemet Lake: Fishing has been slow since the season opened. The lake is low and too much feed is blamed for the poor fishing.

Lake Gregory: Fishing only fair since May 1, but picking up and with warmer weather, should show a marked improvement.

Little Rock Reservoir: Fishing continues good here with several fish up to two pounds and quite a number of limit catches made.


