Nativity Parish School Opened for Inspection

Nativity Parish School at 2371 West Carson street was open for inspection to several hundred visitors Sunday. The building, now completed represents an investment of \$120,000 in a fine educational facility for the local parish.

With pardonable pride, Father P. J. McGuinness explained to the visitors the features of the U-shaped stucco building, which contains eight class room, a library, office, clinic, kitchen and dinette, and is equipped with a public address system.

Contract for construction of the school was let last fall and actual construction was begun October 14. It cost approximately \$100,000, exclusive of the site, furnishings, playground equipment and fencing. The one-story structure has a mission tile roof.

About 800 pupils are expected to enroll for the fall term September 15. Father McGuinness said yesterday.
