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## Local Smelter Commended for Smoke Control

Air pollution control devices used by the Pacific Smelting Company in Torrance are being cited by the Supervisors' Advisory Committee on Air Pollution as good examples of means of eliminating smog in Los Angeles county.

The local installation was pointed out by Prof. L. M. Daugherty of Caltech, chairman of the advisory group, as one of three commendable installations. The other two were the Hammond Lumber company's incinerator on Terminal Island, and the equipment used by the Eastern Iron and Metals Company in Los Angeles.

Some progress towards eventual elimination of smog already has been made, the advisory committee told Dr. C. McCabe, smog director, after a tour through the county's industrial district.

"Your staff has done as much as could be expected in such a short time," Professor Daugherty declared.

Other members of the committee are: Dr. Roy Newsom of Whittier College; Karl Weber, President of Weber Show Case Company; Dewitt E. Strode, Hollywood; and Robert Carson of San Pedro, retired assistant fire chief of Los Angeles. General Amos Thomas, executive assistant of Citizens Smog Advisory (Jeffers) Committee, accompanied the group.

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## Inland Harbor Proposed for Beach Cities

Redondo Beach, Hermosa Beach, Manhattan Beach and the Palms Verdes peninsula will join forces in the development of an inland yacht harbor in the South Bay district according to tentative plans approved by the Associated South Bay Chambers of Commerce.

Development of the harbor, as outlined by Sidney Welch of Redondo Beach, will come after formal proceedings have been inaugurated by a representative committee of 25, working under the leadership of Col. Irwin W. Minger.

A channel, according to present plans, will be dredged through at Bery street in Redondo Beach to run northerly through a low area in Hermosa and Manhattan beaches.

Work on the proposal will begin under a steering committee which includes Welch, Mayor's Charles H. Wortham, Redondo Beach; Paul Drake, Hermosa Beach; and William Suppe of Manhattan Beach; Robert E. Austin, D. Clifford Higgins, Manhattan Beach civic workers; Robert Baughey of Rolling Hills and E. A. Kufus of Lawndale.
