Scout Mothers Club To be Entertained At E. W. Clark Home


The Mothers Club of Boy Scout Troop No. 241 met recently at the home of Mrs. Erwin A. King.

PTA Child Feeding Program Splendid Success, Report

Mrs. Marvin Owen, newly installed president of the Tenth district PTA, has lauded district leaders for the "excellent handling of the recent child feeding emergency."

Mrs. Joseph S. Hook, retiring president, and Harbor PTA associations led by Lomita-San Pedro and Gateway councils, were specially commended by Mrs. Owen for their immediate and generous response in the past two months.

Local women will remember when Mrs. Hook and Owen made emergency pleas in behalf of the feeding bill. At that time, the feeding of needy and undernourished children in the city schools was threatened with stoppage.

In a period of seven weeks, a total of \$14,071.76 was sent to 10th district. Units sent \$13,083.76 during the month of June alone. May's feeding bill of approximately \$20,000 was paid, as was June's "short month" bill of \$9,580.56.

"The children were fed. There is no deficit. There is even a little left over in the feeding fund," Mrs. Owen discloses, which, with monthly allotment given the district by Community Chest, will feed children for a short period immediately after school opening this fall.

The gratitude of thousands of children and their parents go to the PTA members and school authorities who helped in the cause, Mrs. Owen declares. "A reminder goes along with the appreciation, however. There is every indication that 10th district's feeding bill will be even heavier this fall. Much thinking, planning and managing must be done in individual associations and councils. Children must not go hungry," she concludes.

Mrs. J. J. Millard, of Torrance, newly appointed harbor regional director for 10th district and liaison between Mrs. Owen and harbor area associations, reveals that children are never humiliated or embarrassed when their lunches and milk are PTA-supplied. Tickets are handled in such a way that schoolmates never know. "After all, it is future citizens PTA is striving to build."
