### HOSTESSES SOUGHT FOR PARTIES HELD FOR VET PATIENTS AT BRENTWOOD HOSPITAL

Additional hostesses for Friday afternoon parties held from 2 to 4 p.m. at Brentwood Hospital of the West Los Angeles Veterans Administration Center currently is listed as the greatest single need of the Red Cross Community Service to Camps and Hospitals committee.

In announcing the need for more party hostesses, Mrs. Beatrice Weber, director, explained that the informal gatherings have proved a satisfying experience to volunteers because they are helping to rebuild confidence of neuropsychiatric veteran patients who are shortly to be released to their homes for trial visits.

Dr. J. S. Abrams, staff physician, Brentwood hospital, declared: "The work of hostesses at Red Cross parties at the hospital is extremely important in the recovery of the veterans and fills a great need for social contact for these men."

Mrs. Bonnie Parker, recreation director, pointed out that "parties such as these mean far more than play and diversion. They are a very important part in the treatment of our patients," she explained, "because they help to relieve tension and provide opportunities typical of the home and community environment from which the veteran has come and to which he will return. Providing opportunities for satisfactory living and personal growth, the Red Cross gatherings improve the patient's morale and help him to gain confidence in people and himself."

The hostess group is an essential part of the occasions. Women between the ages of 20 and 40, with the desire to serve and with maturity of judgment and understanding, are needed and will be welcomed for the very brief training which is required. Applicants should apply by calling Los Angeles Chapter headquarters. An opportunity can be arranged for new volunteers who desire it, to be taken out as guests for a single party, to be followed by the training and regular assignments.
