**Kiwanians Hear of City's Gains**

An insight into the operation of the city government was given at Monday night's meeting of the Torrance Kiwanis Club by George Stevens, city engineer.

Stevens told the club that the city started the new fiscal year July 1 with \$140,000, which was considerably better financial condition than a year ago. He also said that the city's total assessed valuation for secured and unsecured property would approximate some \$40,000,000 this year.
