**Coastal Basin Deficient in Water Supply, Study Proves**

A four-month study of the water situation in this area has been completed by the County Public Water Supply Advisory Board appointed last March by the supervisors to study growing water problems here.

The board found that a majority of the ground water basins in the county have an adequate supply for many years, but expressed grave concern over the lack of ground water in several localities.

Those listed as deficient in water supply were the west basin (area seaward of the Inglewood fault); the central coastal plain, the Hollywood basin and south to the Inglewood Newport uplift; the Raymond Basin (Pasadena) area, the eastern portion of the county, and the Lancaster basin, which includes Antelope Valley.

The water advisory board recommended that the county seek state legislation which would allow that subdivision of government to establish, in the event of an emergency, a special water conservation district, similar to the recently-created air pollution control district.

This district would be authorized to raise money for construction and operation of facilities to treat and reclaim waste waters for domestic, industrial and agricultural uses. It would also conserve water through spreading of rainwater from flood control facilities.

Emphasis was placed on the board's recommendation that legislation be sought by the county under which it could enforce water conservation regulations in areas that are not legally controlled at present.

This would force private water companies to install meters to compute the consumption of all its users, as a conservation measure.

**Local Chest Leaders Seek Full Support**

Community Chest leaders of Torrance met at the request of B. T. Whitney, chairman, at the offices of the Chamber of Commerce to plan for the fall campaign and to discuss the need for full support of all groups within the community.

Attending the meeting were: Whitney, William A. Zoeller, vice chairman of Special Gifts; George L. Johnson, vice chairman of Establishments; Sam Levy, vice chairman of headquarters and Ralph T. Shaw, administrative assistant of the Community Chest.

Whitney said that with the campaign now approaching it is essential that all residents of Torrance understand the relationship of Chest agencies to this community. It is only with this knowledge, he said, that we can have a unified campaign and enlist the number of volunteers we need to bring the Chest story to the contributor.

Shaw pointed out that Red Feather agencies directly serving Torrance through the First District Welfare Center include YMCA, YWCA, Boy and Girl Scouts, Camp Fire Girls, Veteran Service, Family Service and Catholic Welfare Bureau. In addition to these, he said, there are a number of foster homes, adoptive agencies and organizations for the care of children whose services are available to residents, as they are needed.

Certain centralized agencies are also maintained by the Chest funds, Shaw said. Examples of these are the Children's Hospital, Orthopaedic Hospital and clinic and Cedars of Lebanon Hospital.

The principle of the Community Chest, Shaw explained, is that a single campaign conducted once each year for the operating expenses of 150 agencies is more efficient and more economical than 150 separate, competitive campaigns.

In addition Chest funds are drawn from all resources in the Los Angeles metropolitan area which results in a more extensive program of service than could be maintained if each community were to set up its own health and welfare services.

Goals for the Chest campaign in the various communities now are being worked out. This is done on a "fair share" basis by a committee of volunteers so that no city or town will have an undue burden of fund-raising, Shaw added.

**Vacationists Are Urged to Prevent Fires**

Vacationists this week were urged by Red Cross officials to observe "the rule of five" to prevent forest fires. These important procedures to be practiced are:

1. Break every match in two.
2. If you must build outdoor fires, first ask if the law requires a permit.
3. Drown every fire with water or smother fire with earth from which leaves are removed.
4. Crush out thoroughly your cigarette, cigar or pipe ashes.
5. See that every member of your family knows these rules.


**PRESBYTERIAN SERVICES SET FOR SUNDAY**
