

NEW PAROCHIAL SCHOOL HERE TO OPEN SEPT. 8

The Sisters of St. Joseph of Orange who will teach in the Nativity Catholic school, 2371 W. Carson street, arrived in Torrance Monday afternoon to prepare for the opening of the new parochial school next Wednesday Sept. 8 at 9 a.m.

The Sisters were welcomed by the pastor, Father P. J. McGuinness, who announced that the school will open with the first seven grades, the eighth grade to be added next year.

The Mother House of the Sisters is located at Orange, where the Sisters operate a hospital in conjunction with the Novitiate. Sister M. Richard, Superior of the school, comes from San Francisco where she taught last year at Notre Dame des Victoires, a Catholic high school for girls. Sister Rita Marie comes from St. Agnes school, San Diego; Sister M. Imelda from Notre Dame des Victoires, San Francisco; Sister M. Rosalia from St. Bernard's school, Bellflower; Sister M. Clara from Corpus Christi school, San Francisco and Sister Margaret Ann is from St. Joseph's school, Santa Ana.

The Sisters are temporarily occupying a private home

while the new convent at 1421 Cota avenue is being completed and expected to move to the convent within several weeks.

The ladies of Nativity parish have formed a committee in the meantime and are making plans for a shower for the Sisters to help furnish the convent. Those who wish to present a gift may do so through the following committee members:

The new parochial school, completed at a cost of over \$100,000, is in readiness for the opening of the fall term and will accommodate 350 students. Every facility and convenience has been embodied in the design and construction of the building to make it one of the finest in the state, Father McGuinness said.

SUMMER PLAY PROGRAM ATTRACTS 30,154 KIDS

Tomorrow will bring to a close the joint city-school summer recreation program which has attracted an average daily attendance of 885 children on the five Torrance city playgrounds, it was announced today by Dale Riley, city superintendent of recreation.

Total daily attendance at the five playgrounds hit 30,154, a tribute to the work of the hard-working members of the playground staff.

The program was made possible through the joint efforts of the city of Torrance and the Torrance Unified School district, through the board of education. Members of the city recreation commission whose efforts contributed to the success of the program are Councilman George Powell, George Thatcher, member of the board of education, and the Rev. Torben Olsen.

Attendance at the various playgrounds was totaled as follows: Torrance city park, 8111, an average of 189 a day; Torrance elementary school, 4285, an average of 98 daily; Perry Elementary School, 3369, an average of 77 a day; Fern avenue school, 8578 averaging 197 daily, and Waveria Park, where 5781 attended with an average daily attendance of 135.

Outstanding events of the summer was the pet show, hobby show, "on wheels" week with

a bike parade, doll show, athletics week, baby and beauty show, family night and free afternoon and evening movies.

Maza Infant Report Held Up by County

Results of an autopsy performed last week on four-month-old Terrence Maza still are unknown, according to Ben H. Brown, county coroner.

The infant son of Mr. and Mrs. Lawrence Maza of 1550 W. 204th st., died last Wednesday in its crib. It was believed he had suffocated when he became entangled in his blankets. However, subsequent medical investigation led authorities to believe that pneumonia may have resulted in the child's death.

The body was shipped by Stone and Myers mortuary to Sioux City, Iowa where the family has moved.






