Perry School Plans Double Sessions for Three Grades

Double sessions for kindergarten children and for Grade 1 and Grade 2 will be necessary at Perry elementary school this term because additional housing facilities are not yet available, according to Principal Robert C. Morton. Following is the schedule of classes:

New Torrance Elementary Classes Added

Three new classes are planned for Torrance elementary school when pupils start the fall term next Monday — on the kindergarten, first and second grade levels. Growth of Torrance Manor and the Kettler Knolls subdivisions are largely responsible for this expansion, according to Principa William Clink enbard.

Parents of children enrolling for the first time are urged to accompany their children to school the opening day so that the necessary enrollment forms may be completed. Pupils should either bring a lunch or plan on going home for lunch, since the cafeteria has not been completed.

Bus transportation will be provided for those pupils living outside the mile and a half bus boundary line. This includes pupils living south of 2300th street and those from Torrance Manor. Pupils are urged to be at the bus stops shortly after 8 a.m. the first day.

J. R. Davidson, who was on the Walteria elementary school faculty last year, has been engaged as vice-principal at Torrance elementary, and will also be in charge of the upper grade physical education program.

Following are the schedules: Kindergarten, two classes in the morning session from 9 to 12 and two in the afternoon session from 12:30 to 3:30 p.m. Teachers: Mrs. Pearson, Miss Erringer, Mrs. Jones and Mrs. Nichols.

Primary grades, sessions from 9 a.m. to 2:10 p.m. with an hour lunch period from 12 to 1 p.m. Teachers: Grade 1—Mrs. Boyd, Mrs. Cramer, Mrs. Harndenbrook, Mrs. Newman and Miss Knoll; Grade 2—Miss Jackson, Miss Lindsey, Miss Pederon and Mrs. Freeman. Grade 3—Mrs. Powell, Mrs. McClosky and Mrs. Menulur.

Upper grades, sessions from 9 to 3:30 with lunch from 12 to 1 o'clock. Teachers: Grade 4—Mrs. Barnett, Miss Kersch and Mrs. Huizing; Grade 5—Mrs. Hodgson, Mrs. Murphree and Mrs. Grace; Grade 6—Mrs. Holt, Mrs. Hester and Mr. Foster.

Torrance School Children Saved \$60 Each Last Year

An average of \$60 per child was saved by 503 children of the Torrance school system who participated in the five-month period between February and June, according to the annual report of the superintendent of schools.

"This thrift project was highly successful when compared with the state average of only \$48 per child," Supt. J. H. Hull said.

Other highlights of the annual report were:

The instrumental music department started out the beginning of the year with 17 students playing instruments and ended with 150. In addition, 100 students were beginning on sweetwaters to determine whether or not they had musical talent.

The Band Mothers' Club is obtaining uniforms for the band for 1948-49, thus helping the music program to be well under way after only one year of existence.

A tour of the Harbor area, a trip to the fire station, and Saturday trips to special musical concerts were made during the year as a part of the educational program experienced by the Torrance school children.

Newspaper offices, dairies, oil companies, Griffith Park observatory, the County Museum and the Freedom Train were visited.

The County Library Service, procured by the Board of Education through the cooperation of the office of the county superintendent, provided the school district with over 4,000 volumes of books for the elementary school level. This service, consisting of four books per child per year with exchange privileges, gave much valuable material for the courses of study. This material could not have been available had it been necessary to make outright purchases of these books.
