


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Schools Site Master Plan Agreed Upon

Preparation of a master plan for the Torrance High School plant, showing the location of additional facilities that may be needed as the school expands has been authorized by the Torrance board of education.

The plan will show the location of the cafeteria, additional shop and home economics facilities that may be needed and facilities for instrumental music and other needed expansion, officials said.

Also included will be parking areas and development of the athletic field and physical education facilities that will be needed as enrollment increases.

Mrs. Grace Wright suggested that the Torrance elementary school site also will be included in the master plan, because it occupies area immediately adjacent, and this was included in the motion made by George Thatcher and seconded by Carl Steele.

The school's architects, Daniel, Mann and Johnson, will prepare the plan, according to Supt. J. H. Hull.

Snapshooters Will Have Big Time at Fair

"Gosh I wish I had a picture of that." Don't let that be your wall when you see little junior's expression as he trots around the loop on a pony, or has his face covered with spun-sugar candy.

Bring your camera to the Factory Frolic and grab some of those "never-to-be-repeated" scenes. Then pick your best shot and enter it in the Torrance Herald A-1 Photo Service picture contest.

Any pictures taken at the Frolic might win one of the five prizes being given for the best shots of children, action or any of the many hundreds of Fair activities.

The contest is open to anyone that can take a picture except professionals. There is no age limit, ability requirement, entry fee, or any entanglements. You don't have to buy a thing. No soap-box top to tear off or slogans to write. Just snap a picture at the Factory Frolic and enter it in the contest.

You don't even need to own a camera! The A-1 Photo Service will have available at its booth in the big top a supply of cameras that may be borrowed—without charge—for you to use to take pictures.

To give the snapshooter, the work-a-day picture-taker, a chance for one of the prizes, (a flash-equipped camera) the contest has been separated into two divisions. One for the "Hold still, now smile" amateur and another division for the more advanced amateur.

If you win one of the prizes, your picture (with your consent) may be used in the Torrance Herald as a news feature in support of the community-sponsored Factory Frolic.

For those who may be interested in the contest here are the few simple rules and explanations of the contest:

Anyone is eligible except professionals.

Pictures must show some phase of the Factory Frolic. (Pictures taken of any of the Miss Industry candidates will be considered eligible.)

Prints should be 8x10, but 5x7's will be acceptable. The photographer taking the picture need not make the print submitted. Prints made by a commercial photo finishing plant will be accepted.

Entries may be turned into the A-1 Photo Service Store, 1812 Sartori avenue, Torrance, or to the editorial department of the Torrance Herald at any time. Deadline for entries is September 25, 1948.

All prints will remain the property of the contestant and will be returned to the owner at the completion of the contest.

By mutual agreement of the photographer and the Torrance Herald, the Torrance Herald may publish some of the winning pictures as a news feature with due credit being given to the contestant making the picture. Prints will be returned to the photographer.

The contest will be divided into two divisions: Amateur Division: To the amateur submitting the best print made from a snapshot, a \$15 flash-equipped camera or merchandise of that amount, will be given. If you have no camera to take snapshots the Factory Frolic one may be borrowed without charge from the A-1 Photo Service booth at the "Big Top."

Advanced Amateur Division: Three prizes of \$10 in merchandise of the photographer's own selection will be awarded to the photographer submitting the best print in each of the following classes: Children's Action, or General Fair Activities. The print judged to be best of all those submitted, regardless of the Division in which it was submitted, a \$25 cash award will be given. Prints will be considered eligible for only one prize.

Prints judged to be worthy of display will be exhibited in the windows of the A-1 Photo Service store. The name of the photographer will be indicated on the prints displayed.

Stray Dogs on School Areas Are Problem

With vacation playtime over for children and their dogs, school and health officials are concerned with the annual problem of pet dogs following their small masters to school, according to Dr. H. C. Smiley, Torrance district health officer.

Several children were severely bitten by dogs on school playgrounds last year, the health officer warned, and in any congregation of family pets the stray dog, perhaps infected with rabies, is also attracted to the group and is a menace to the health of school children.

During the first eight months of this year, 158 rabid animals were reported in Los Angeles County, four of which were in Torrance health district. Records show there were 14,312 dog bites reported in the county for the same period.

County and city health codes call for dogs to be kept on their owners' property or on a leash under the control of a responsible person.

Ammonia Plant Proposed for Smog Problem

Proposal that a surplus ammonia plant be obtained from the War Department and installed "somewhere in an industrial area" was under consideration today by county officials as a solution to at least one phase of the smog problem.

Dr. Louis C. McCabe, air pollution control director, made the proposal in a long report to the Board of Supervisors on observations as to the actual source of the smog that plagues downtown Los Angeles in particular.

"Cheap ammonia would make it possible to use the ammonium sulfate or the ammonium sulfite-bisulfite process to remove sulfur dioxide from stack gases," he pointed out. "Ammonium sulfate for fertilizer and liquid sulfur dioxide produced by these processes should find a ready market. If the War Department were to allocate a surplus ammonia plant to this area, there is a relatively easy solution to a major part of our smog problem," he concluded.

The haze which begins soon after sunrise and moves north-eastward over the county "is very likely due" to the formation of sulfuric acid mist through the effect of sunlight on sulfur dioxide, which is largely released into the air by oil refineries, chemical plants and oil-burning industries, Dr. McCabe said.

The great bulk of the sulfur compounds in the atmosphere — estimated by the petroleum industry to total 822 tons daily — emanates from the refineries, according to their own figures, the smog director declared. Gasoline burned in automobiles account burned in a automobile accounts for 22 tons of sulfur dioxide daily and the burning of Diesel oil for 12 tons, the figures show.

Dr. McCabe then proposed as a solution for this problem the obtaining of a surplus ammonia plant for Southern California from the War Department.


