Foresees High Egg Prices in Winter Time

Good poultry management this fall and winter will pay big dividends, says A. T. Dietz, assistant farm advisor in Los Angeles county. Egg prices are likely to remain high through-out the winter while feed prices will drop, giving more profit to the farmers.

A large increase in the number of laying hens is expected next summer and fall because of the lower cost of feed. Egg prices should drop correspondingly as the supply of fresh eggs increases.

To insure profits both this year and next, better feed, better housing, and good poultry methods are going to be very important this winter, Dietz said.

SISTER KENNY POLIO TECHNICIANS ARRIVE

Two wards at Los Angeles County Harbor Hospital, Torrance, this week were staffed with fully-trained Sister Elizabeth Kenny technicians transferred here from other Kenny treatment centers of the country to aid in the area's second worst infantile paralysis epidemic.

Marvin L. Kline, executive director of the Sister Kenny Foundation, returned to national headquarters in Minneapolis this week after assuring health officials here that the world-renowned Kenny treatment would continue to be made available to polio sufferers as long as the present emergency exists.

"Complete Kenny treatment, heretofore available only in mid-western and eastern areas, is now administered for the first time on the west coast by technicians who have received two-year training periods, much of it under personal teaching of Sister Kenny herself," Kline said.

More than 2000 polio patients have been restored to normal life with crippled effects and deformities mini-

Ingot Pouring Eliminated in New Process

Six years of research sponsored by two American manufacturers is believed to have solved for the steel industry a problem as important as "getting cheese direct from the cow" would be for the dairy industry.

The steel industry's problem was how to produce steel billets without first pouring the molten metal into moulds to make steel ingots.

Such a process would make it unnecessary to reheat the ingots in soaking pits and pass them through powerful blooming mills to work them down into smaller, semi-finished shapes called "blooms, slabs and billets."

The new process, which is working well in a pilot plant, produces billets directly from molten steel, eliminating the need for making the ingots and putting them through the blooming mills.

The steel produced by the new process has been finished satisfactorily into such products as forging bars and strips.
