Warriors 'Away' for Two Weeks After Taft Win

El Camino Warriors defeated the Taft Cougars by a score of 60 at Sentinel Field in Inglewood on Saturday, October 2. This was the second win for the Warriors for this identical score. The earlier win was from Ventura Junior College at the Redondo Sea Hawk Bowl. The El Camino touchdown against Taft came in the third quarter following a 35 yard pass from Cecil Schmeckle to Dick Carter. Two plays later Schmeckle was over for the only touchdown of the game. Taft was surprisingly strong and presented a much improved line-up for the aggression which lost to El Camino last year by a score of 45-6.

For the next two weeks the Warriors become travelers. Friday, October 8, the Warriors journey to Bakersfield to meet the Bakersfield Junior College Renegades. The next week on Saturday, October 16, they will meet Modesto Junior College at Modesto and will instigate with that college a home-and-home engagement. Bakersfield, who last year succumbed to the El Camino field goal combination of Les Kazarian and Jerry Witt by a score of 9-6, is out to get revenge on the Warriors.

Next home contest for El Camino will be October 23, 8 p.m. at Redondo Sea Hawk Bowl where the Warriors meet San Diego Navy.

Frank Coleman, 160-pound right halfback. Fast. Good pass receiver. Scored against Wilson.

At the ends are Jordan's gold dust twins, Captain Dave Magel and Bill Howard. Magel played 60 minutes of ball against Wilson. He is big and tough. Beautiful receiver of deep passes. Really fights for the ball. As for 190-pound Howard—ditto.

As for the stuff in between the ends there are these:

Calvin Coleman, LG, 210 pounds.
Russell Bonowitz, C, 195 pounds.
Herman Harrelson, RG, 180 pounds.
Melvin Tebbutt, RT, 210 pounds.

That's an average of over 200 pounds between the ends—a lot of beef to move before the Tartars can hit pay dirt.

If the Torrance squad gets very far against Jordan it will be by deception and not force. They just haven't the beef squad to throw against the team from

Long Beach. Not alone is the fact that the Tartar line is light but they are lacking in line "know how." This is through no fault of their own Coach Eddie Cole or Rex Welch, who were both backfield men in college days. It could well be that the championship of the 1948 Bay League could go to Torrance if their line can hold against Jordan, but if not...

There is the aerial route to the goal line that the Tartars may be forced to travel if they hope to do much scoring. Up to now, however, most of Torrance's yardage has been gained on the ground. Their passing attack has not been too sharp.

Possible proof of the fact that the Tartar line is the weak spot of the squad is this bit of action from the Burroughs game last Saturday night:

A bad quick-kick by Burroughs was returned by Buddy Licht from the 40 to 34 yard line. Milo Goetsch took it to the 30. Licht carried it to the 16. Then Goetsch to the 9. Goetsch to the 8. Tarbabes Gun for Initial Loop Win at Jordan Today

Bouncing back from a one-sided 20-0 victory over a weak Burbank team last Thursday afternoon, the Torrance High Bee squad tackles a rough Jordan lightweight outfit today on the Panthers gridiron to open the 1948 Bee pigskin season in the Bay circuit.

This year's Jordan team is tabbed by many football experts as the greatest in Southern California since "Cotton" Warburton played for San Diego in 1923 and Wilson 33-4. Whittier 19-0 and Wilson 33-4. Coach Cliff Graybill, although satisfied with his team's initial showing, has been drilling the team in an effort to stop the Jordanites. In Monday's scrimmage session Bobby Yoles, one of the fastest backs on the team, received an ankle injury which will prevent him from seeing action for at least a week.

Running the Burroughs line to shreds, the Tarbabe powerhouse last Thursday amassed 321 yards in total offense while holding their opponents to 51.
