El Camino College Classes Filled; 2019 Enrolled

El Camino College, now in its second year, already is filled to capacity, it was learned yesterday from H. J. Sheffield, director of student personnel.

During the last year the school's enrollment has jumped nearly 100 percent to a total of 2019 students. Last year the local college enrolled 1107 students in its day and night classes.

Of the current enrollees 745 are veterans—375 of whom are studying under the G.I. Bill of Rights, Sheffield said. The ratio of men students to women students is nearly three-to-one.

Approximately 1450 men students are receiving instruction at the two-year-old college while only 500 women are receiving schooling.

With the exception of a few openings in industrial and technical course at night, the fall classes are now closed to new enrollments.

Double sessions for Torrance elementary school children now have been eliminated above the third grade, school officials disclosed yesterday.

Fifth grade pupils at Walteria school, together with their teachers, now are transported daily to Torrance elementary school where regular classes are conducted.



for LOCAL CONTROL of INTOXICATING LIQUORS

Proposition No. 2

A Provides local control as follows:

- "To regulate the presence of minors in on-sale licensed premises."
(Would open the saloon doors to minors)
- To require proper illumination, ventilation and sanitation of saloons.
(This is already covered by law.)

B Not Matters of Local Control:

- An unaccompanied woman may be served intoxicating liquors only when seated at a table.
- Complaints may be filed only by governing bodies or chief officers, and only a gainst licenses in force or up for renewal.
- Although the law permits only one on-sale place for each 2,500 people, should that number be exceeded renewals and transfers would not be affected.
- "Section 22, of Article XX of the constitution adopted Nov. 6, 1934 shall remain in full force and effect." This section reads, "The state shall have the EXCLUSIVE POWER TO LICENSE AND REGULATE the manufacture, sale, purchase, possession and transportation of intoxicating liquor."

THIS IS NO IMPROVEMENT, OFFERS NO CONTROL BY THE COMMUNITY AND LEAVES ALL IN THE HANDS OF THE BOARD OF EQUALIZATION.

Proposition No. 12

(a) Provides that no license to sell intoxicating liquors shall be granted, renewed or transferred without the approval of the community where the business shall be conducted.

(b) "The governing body of each City, City and County and County is hereby vested with plenary power to make and enforce ordinances and regulations which forbid or regulate the sale and barter of intoxicating liquor in all or any portion of the area within its boundaries."

(c) The qualified voters "shall have power by charter provision or by initiative ordinance to forbid or regulate the sale and barter of intoxicating liquor" within their boundaries.
