

Catholic Bazaar to Feature Varied Booths, Attractions

A gala bazaar, to be supported and staged by the combined organizations of Nativity Catholic Church, will open tomorrow (Friday) at 7:30 p.m. in Nativity Parish Hall, 1448 Cota avenue. Y-TEEN PROGRAM TO BE INSTITUTED AT T. H. S.

Y-Teens are coming to Torrance High School and Junior High School, according to Miss Elaine Allsbrook, Torrance YWCA program director. Y-Teen is the name given to YWCA clubs of teenage girls and to the girls in these clubs.

Y-Teen club girls plan their own varied programs of social affairs, discussions, business meetings, trips, service projects and interest groups. Meetings are generally held weekly under the leadership of elected officers with the help of an adult advisor. An inter-club council made up of representatives of all the Y-Teen clubs in a community plans important events such as a Christmas celebration or joint club activities under the sponsorship of the YWCA director.

Torrance clubs will be affiliated with other Y-Teen clubs in the Los Angeles area for a mid-winter week-end conference and with clubs all over California in a week long summer conference at Asilomar, the YWCA

conference grounds on the Monterey peninsula.

Besides belonging to her own club, each Y-Teen is a junior member of the National YWCA and through that of the World's YWCA. Because the movement is international and because the program is built on a Christian purpose, there is opportunity for Y-Teens to meet and understand girls and women of other nationalities and other races. Membership in Y-Teen clubs is open to any girl in junior high or high school.




